## King's Road Shopwatch Radiolink

At the July Retail Forum meeting the Police gave a presentation on how a shopwatch scheme for the King's Road would work. It was agreed that this was a top priority for the King's Road and if possible the scheme should be up and running for Christmas.

Joining the scheme costs £7.50 per week and all participating retailers need to do is to completed the application form. Jo Hammond is hand delivering forms to businesses, starting at the eastern end of the road, but if retailers want to sign up now the form can be downloaded from the RBKC website <http://www.rbkc.gov.uk/businessandenterprise/towncentres/towncentreinitiative/s/kingsroad.aspx>

As soon as 10 shops have signed up the radiolink suppliers Resound can get the aerial put up and apply for a license. Once these are in place the scheme can start operating. We are hoping to have this in place before Christmas but it is completely dependent on how quickly businesses sign up.

### 1. Setting out a clear plan

- identifies the key priorities;
- has an agreed timeframe with goals which are deliberately stretching so there is something to reach for and something to feel proud about.

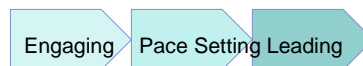
### 2. Working together to bring this shared vision to life

This will involve:

- engaging with everyone who has an interest in the King's Road and Sloane Square
- making the most of the talents we have within the retail forum
- collaborating with key stake-holders
- engaging subject experts

### 3. Focussing on results

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- having a clear plan guided by a clear vision
- having a detailed plan for year 1
- ensuring we have the best people to deliver each part of the plan
- identify key moments to review how we are performing.

At the next meeting we will discuss how we can develop a vision for King's Road and set up a small working group to take this forward.

### Fit for Work Pilot

Fit for Work is a new service operating across Kensington and Chelsea for the benefit of employed people who are off sick, and their employers. It offers quick free access to personalised services designed to support employees back to work more quickly, and to support employers in making the return to work as effective as possible. Services include counselling, acupuncture, physiotherapy, osteopathy, clinical exercise, housing support, employment support and training, and debt advice.

To access the service, individuals must live in Kensington and Chelsea, and be employed / self-employed. Clients can self refer, or may be referred via their GP or their employer with the client's consent.

# Visitors' views of the King's Road

In 2006 Visit London conducted research interviewing visitors to London that identified there are some places in the capital which are very strong place brands. These are places that are recognised across the world and people know what to expect when they go there.

Chelsea and Fulham was identified as one of these place brands, although the research found Chelsea and Fulham are very different. Chelsea has good positive associations and imagery but Fulham much less so. Chelsea is a place brand - Fulham is not.

## The positive associations for Chelsea were:

- The King's Road
- Fashion Shops [boutiques]
- Restaurants
- Football [but this is polarising for men and women - and even between men]
- Wealthy
- Clean
- Expensive
- Safe
- The river
- The embankment
- The flower show
- The Hospital.

## The negative associations were

- Snobby
- Posy [although this can be positive if you're doing the posing]
- 4x4s
- Parking and access (no tubes).

## The brand personality for Chelsea was identified as **Chic, Sexy, Fashionable, Fun, Famous.**

The research showed Chelsea has a very rich set of brand imagery - so much so - that it really feels like a separate piece of London. Some people found it hard to define exactly where Chelsea started and stopped - but the heart seems to be the Kings Road. Whilst Chelsea is essentially 'commercial' (shops and restaurants) - it punches above it's weight in terms of brand appeal. It's appeal only seems to diminish for those with very young families.

**"There's nothing quite like this here" [Birmingham].**

**"A great place to cruise..."**

**"Where Punk Rock started. It's where the modern history of London started."**

**"It's good day or night. "**

# Kings Road Walk

As part of the new RBKC visitor website currently under development, and due to launch in December 2010, we are developing a series of walks across the borough that will appeal to visitors. So far we have identified the following points of interest along King's Road.

- **Royal Court Theatre, Sloane Square** where kitchen-sink drama started.
- **Sloane Square** – Sir Hans Sloane and the Venus Fountain
- **Duke of York Square** - the map of the King's private toll road
- **The Saatchi Gallery**
- **49 Kings Road, formerly The Chelsea Drugstore (now McDonalds)**
- **Kings Road Café Picasso** one of the famous King's Road Coffee Shops
- **Chelsea Registry Office** where many famous people have married.
- **138 King's Road, Markham House** – site of Mary Quant's Bazaar.
- **213 King's Road** – home of producer/director Carol Reid
- **215 King's Road** – home of Thomas Arne who composed Rule Britannia here
- **430 King's Road Vivienne Westwood's World's End**
- **King's Road Sophisticat** – the furniture shop home of Christian the Lion star of one of the most downloaded You Tube clips of all time.
- **488 Formerly King's Road Granny Takes a Trip** – famous for its window designs that included the front end of a 1947 Dodge
- **The Pheasantry** originally a hunting lodge and subsequently home to a Russian ballet school, Eric Clapton's studio and where Germaine Greer wrote the Female Eunuch.
- **Chelsea Potter** – a classic King's Road pub, once a haunt of Jim Morrison.
