Summary

Introduction

As part of the Abingdon Ward City Living, Local Life initiative Ward Councillors commissioned a survey of residents in order to canvass views on local priorities and suggested community projects.

A survey was developed by Ward Members for Abingdon Ward. A paper copy of the questionnaire was sent to all households in Abingdon Ward, using the Council Tax Register. A total of 244 responses were received equating to a response rate of three per cent.

Local area

Respondents were asked which issues or topics interested them in the local area. The topic receiving the most comments was planning and developments. Comments focused on both specific developments and basement developments, which a number of respondents were concerned about.

Almost as many respondents (36) commented on transport or traffic issues and 33 respondents commented on issues relating to community safety or policing. Other areas of interest included parking (26 comments), refuse and recycling (19 comments), street cleaning or refuse bins (18 comments) and street trees and greenery (18 comments).

Topics for public meeting

With a view to planning for a public meeting on 28 May, respondents were given a list of topics and asked which issues they would like to hear more about; respondents were able to tick as many options as they wished.

The most popular topics were transport (53 per cent), crime and local policing (48 per cent), planning applications (44 per cent) and rubbish and recycling (43 per cent).

City Living, Local Life projects

As part of the Council's City Living, Local Life project, Abingdon Councillors have up to £15,000 to invest in the Ward on practical local projects, this might be a large project or a series of smaller schemes (£1,000 - £5,000). Respondents were asked for their ideas for projects and how this money might be spent.

A total of 42 respondents suggested ideas for environmental improvements to the area. This included ideas such as more street trees and hanging baskets to maintaining street cleanliness and refuse bins.

Other top topics included activities or facilities for children and young people (19 comments), transport and traffic (19 comments), cycling (12 comments) and combating dog fouling (12 comments).

Diamond Jubilee

A total of 41 per cent of respondents indicated that they would be interested in attending local Diamond Jubilee festivities.

Summary

Volunteering

Almost a quarter (23 per cent) indicated that they currently volunteer, whilst seven in ten (70 per cent) do not.

Respondents were asked if they were interested in finding out about volunteering locally; almost half (48 per cent) indicated that they would be. Almost four in ten (39 per cent) indicated they were not interested.

Residents' Associations

Over half (57 per cent) of respondents indicated that they are a member of a local residents' association; whilst 37 per cent indicated they were not.

Those that are not a member of a residents' association were asked if they would like to be sent information on one nearby. A total of 39 per cent of respondents would like this, whilst 59 per cent would not.

Introduction

Introduction

City Living, Local Life (CLLL) is a new initiative where Ward Councillors and the community in their ward work together to identify local issues that matter and find practical ways to make the area a better place to live. As part of the Abingdon Ward CLLL initiative Ward Councillors commissioned a survey of residents in order to canvass views on local priorities and suggested community projects. The survey was also used to collect the contact details of Abingdon Ward residents who wished to be further involved in the initiative.

Methodology

A survey was developed in collaboration with the Ward Members for Abingdon Ward. A paper copy of the questionnaire was sent to all households in Abingdon Ward, using the Council Tax Register. In total, the questionnaire was posted to 7,100 households. Residents were also given the option of completing their questionnaire online or using their smartphone. However, only a small number of electronic responses were received (eight).

A total of 244 responses were received, this equates to a response rate of three per cent.

Results in this document show percentage figures. Where graphs do not add up to 100 per cent this may be due to computer rounding or that respondents were able to select more than one answer.

Local issues

Respondents were given the opportunity to comment on the issues or topics that interest them in the local area. These comments have been themed and summarised in the below table, but a full list of comments can be seen in appendix 2.

A total of 37 respondents made comments relating to planning or developments in the borough. Comments ranged from those on specific developments, to comments on basement developments, to just those indicating an interest in planning, for example:

"Planning applications/particularly on-going plans for cinema in Kensington High Street."

"Planning, especially basement excavations. Given that London sits on a bed of clay, is it really a great idea to make lots of holes in this clay? I can see houses collapsing because there is nothing holding them up!"

"Involvement in planning the environment, leisure and the community."

Thirty six respondents commented on transport or traffic issues. A number of comments related to specific transport or traffic problems and traffic congestion generally, for example:

"Traffic:- especially the very heavy use of Marloes Road, particularly as a short cut between Cromwell Road and High Street Kensington. Drivers tend to go at relatively high speeds. In addition many small vans and coaches use the street. Would be good to have less traffic or slower - possibly a mini roundabout at crossing with Lexham Gardens."

"Traffic problems - Pembroke Road/Earl's Court Road."

"A road near Notting Hill Gate where you turn to go towards High Street Kensington, you never get a chance to get across."

A total of 33 respondents made comments relating to policing or community safety. Comments mainly focused on keeping the area safe or a concern about crime, for example:

"I am interested in the parks as that is where my kids play. I am also interested in having a safe place to live."

"The reduction of police officers on the streets."

"Interested in setting up a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme to ensure the health and safety of my neighbours and the local community in my ward."

Twenty six respondents commented on parking in the borough. Comments focused on enforcement, lack of spaces or just parking generally, for example:

"Would prefer easier parking i.e. less yellow signs at only one time!"

"Inconsiderable parking by holders of Resident's parking permits who do not use space in parking bays sensibly (e.g. leaving large gaps at the front of a bay thereby reducing, say a three car bay to a two car bay."

"Conserving pleasant environment; crime; adequate residents' parking and discouraging noisy vehicles."

A total of 19 respondents made comments relating to refuse collections or recycling, for example:

"Recycling: - I would like to see organic waste recycling being a possibility."

"Rubbish collection and street cleaning is my top local priority (despite the law of the third weekly collection), I am not dissatisfied with the service - but we must keep the twice weekly service and monitor current levels of street cleaning)."

Two respondents questioned if recycling was actually happening, for example:

"Recycling, is it really happening? Do the orange bags go to a different place than the black ones?"

A total of 18 respondents made comments relating to street cleaning or rubbish bins on the streets, for example:

"Keeping the High Street clean, lively and attractive."

"We need more dustbins on the High Street."

The same number (18) made comments on street trees and greenery. The comments primarily relating to residents wishing to see more, for example:

"Please plant more trees on the streets."

In addition 16 respondents commented on dog fouling, 14 on cycling and 10 on business issues. A full list of comments can be found in appendix 2.



Topics for the public meeting

With a view to planning for a public meeting on 28 May, respondents were given a list of topics and asked which issues they would like to hear more about. Respondents were able to tick as many options as they wished.

The most popular topics were transport (53 per cent), crime and local policing (48 per cent), planning applications (44 per cent) and rubbish and recycling (43 per cent).

Over a third (38 per cent) would like major planning developments covered and more than a quarter (27 per cent) would like to hear about services for the elderly. Around a fifth wanted education (22 per cent) and services for the disabled (20 per cent) covered and 15 per cent would like housing discussed.

Results

Around one in ten (11 per cent) indicated 'other' topics that they would like to see covered. These comments have been themed and can be seen in the table below, with all comments in appendix 2.

Five respondents would like to see services for young people or babies, for example:

"Services for disadvantaged young people."

Three respondents wanted to see cycle safety or cycling on the pavement covered, for example:

"Anti-social cyclists who think that the pavement is a cycle lane!"

Two respondents wanted to discuss elderly care, for example:

"Care for elderly and disabled within their families and community."

Two respondents wanted to discuss dog fouling, for example:

"Dog fouling in the streets and owners not clearing up and taking bags home."

Two respondents wanted to discuss improvements to the environment, for example:

"Tree planting scheme."

City Living, Local Life projects and initiatives

As part of the Council's City Living, Local Life project, Abingdon Councillors have up to £15,000 to invest in the Ward on practical local projects, this might be a large project or a series of smaller schemes (£1,000 - £5,000). Respondents were asked for their ideas for projects and how this money might be spent. The comments made have been themed and summarised in the below table, but a full list of comments can be seen in appendix 2.

A total of 42 respondents suggested ideas for environmental improvements to the area. This included ideas such as more street trees and hanging baskets to maintaining street cleanliness and refuse bins, for example:

"Plant-replant trees (especially in Scarsdale Villas/Abingdon Road)."

"More rubbish bins. Gardens and gardening in public spaces trees/hanging baskets etc."

"1. Making our ward "more green". 2. Planting trees. 3. Helping local residents groups to improve their estates/gardens (especially if on view to all)."

"Raised flower beds in tarmac triangle at t-junction of Cromwell Road and Cromwell Crescent. Provision of dog excrement bins for Edwardes Square and Pembroke Square - currently plastic bags of excrement left in gutters for road sweepers to collect."

Nineteen suggested activities or facilities for children and young people, for example:

"Provide better social activities for young people."

"Also sporting facilities for the young to give them somewhere to go so they can meet together as many are unable to have friends over to their homes."

"Increased activities for children of all age groups."

Nineteen respondents also commented about transport or traffic, for example:

"A roundabout at the intersection of Marloes Road and Lexham Gardens would benefit a lot of people. This is a very bad intersection with many accidents and drivers honking also at night. There is such a roundabout at the intersection of Allen Street and Scarsdale Villas as well as on Abingdon Villas. It would also be good to have a crossing close to that intersection."

"Improve traffic flow and parking facilities."

"Traffic calming to stop speeding/jumping lights."

Twelve respondents made comments about cycling. Some were in favour of cycle lanes or cycle racks or bays, whilst others wanted to see stricter controls, for example:

"Bicycle bays (there are very few!)."

"Street wardens to control cyclists on pavements - to do the many things the police do not have the time to do."

Results

Twelve respondents also wanted the money to be spent on combating dog fouling, for example:

"Provision of more bins for dog mess in the streets in this ward."

"Effective surveillance and prosecution of dog polluters."

A total of 11 respondents wanted to see projects aimed at services for elderly or disabled residents, for example:

"Anything which helps identify local elderly people, especially those living alone."

"Something that could bring elderly and disabled people together - in a "local support" programme: - including activities to benefit them - exercises, yoga, reading club, phone lists for mutual support. Regular meeting (monthly)."

Ten respondents suggested community events, activities or facilities, for example:

"Local community centre i.e. re-opening the cafe on Pembroke Road for coffee and tea for local residents thus creating a HUB for community cohesion!"

"Summer family activity in Holland Park."

Nine respondents made suggestions around recycling, for example:

"Large container for each square street for centralised recycling and rubbish disposal similar to Westminster Council. We have an awful problem of foxes spreading out rubbish placed on the street overnight."



Length of residency

Respondents were asked to indicate how long they have lived in the borough. Almost a third (30 per cent) have lived in the borough for 10 years or less, with a third (33 per cent) living in the borough between 11 and 30 years and almost a third (32 per cent) have lived in the borough for 31 years or more.


Of those responding, the average length of time that respondents had lived in the borough was just over 23 years.

Diamond Jubilee festivities


A total of 46 per cent of respondents indicated that they would be interested in attending local Diamond Jubilee festivities.

Volunteering


Almost a quarter (23 per cent) indicated that they currently volunteer, whilst seven in ten (70 per cent) do not currently volunteer.



Graph shows percentages for the 244 residents responding to this survey


Residents' Associations

Those that are not a member of a residents' association were asked if they would like to be sent information on one nearby. Over half (59 per cent) would like this, whilst 39 per cent would not.




Graph shows percentages for the 140 residents that indicated they are not members of a residents' association

A large number of written comments have been received to the survey. The comments are grouped together by theme. Each comment may have more than one theme. Where this is the case comments have been counted under each theme as appropriate.

Please tell us the issues/topics that most interest you in the local area

Arts and culture

- IT/IPad and computer help. Art shows (showing local artists) Water colour oil painting classes.
- Community life including sports facilities/activities for teenagers, culture in general/public health.
- 1. Clean streets. 2. Crime free. 3. Planning permission. 4. Alleviation of poverty. 5. Arts festivals. Completion with other boroughs post -2012.
- The Albert Hall, Leighton House (I am a patron) and KCMS (Kensington and Chelsea Music Society). Holland Park (member) Neighbourhood Watch
- 1. Excessively tall buildings. 2. Parking. 3. Policing. 4. Youth mentoring. 5. Holland Park opera.
- Cultural events/exhibitions

- Pedestrian crossing lights, inadequate time to cross for families and elderly. Parkland for the community. Discouraging illegal use of fireworks, illegal cycling on pavements at high speed and cluttering pavements with waste well before collection days. Pavement parking of vehicles. Pavement damage e.g. by heavy vehicles.
- 1. Cyclists and skateboarders are a problem on pavements. 2. I have poor eyesight and on bright days I cannot see the green man at zebra crossings. Could we have a "beeping" sound at every zebra crossing?
- 1. Safety environment, gardens/green areas/biking paths access.
- Post Office removal of local post office in Stratford Road and also that we have to go to W14, to collect parcels. Road schemes Exhibition Road and South Kensington has not enhanced traffic flow. Planning we live in a conservation area but businesses and developers seem to be allowed to get away with inappropriate designs (and have different view). Parking if someone owns a property they should be able to park. Bicycles and scooters have become a danger on the road have bicycle lanes and enforcement on stopping them riding across red lights, pulling across cars etc.
- Bicycling on pavements. (I bike, drive and walk but increasingly I am really concerned and at risk when walking in the ward. With one of two exceptions I see zero effort to communicate with cyclist and educate them about the law, zero signage, zero police action).
- Library changing this to better ways for those without internet, to access computers Wi-Fi. Cycling - I would love to see places around streets where there is a lock-up facility for bikes.

Dangerous dogs

• 1. Cycle parking bay. 2. Dangerous dog. 3. Improve lighting of the street.

Do not spend

Consolidate finances/do not spend!!

Doctors' surgeries

• 1. Parking - my husband has disabled badge, but often cannot park on meters because of the number of police vehicles in Cope Place. 2. Poor access for disabled buggy to Abingdon Road. 3. Pressure on Abingdon surgery because of closing Kensington Place surgery. Also anticipated pressure from new development in Warwick Road.

Dog fouling

- Too many dog owners leave their dog mess in bags in the gutter (rather than disposing
 of it themselves). Perhaps we need an education programme in the borough to let people
 know that the dog mess fairy does not exist and will not come along at night to remove
 them.
- The accepted practice of throwing dog-mess bags into the gutters is repulsive. Either ban the practice altogether and fine offenders or use some of the money below to have bins placed throughout the borough, Kensington and Chelsea is not Brixton.

- Flaunting of planning permission by property developers. Maintenance of properties by landlords/owners. Dog mess.
- 1. State of the pavements i.e. cyclists using pavements instead of roads. 2. Uneven paving stones. 3. Occasional dog mess.
- 1. Air pollution, traffic held up in Earl's Court Road, polluting the area, sometimes making
 it difficult to breathe. 2. Cyclists speeding up and down pavements. 3. Dog mess in
 Logan Place.
- 1. Maintain and develop greenery especially trees. 2. Fine dog-fouling culprits. 3. Less density including height of buildings and all clutter on top of them.
- Inconsiderate parking by taking up too much space. Plastic bags left by dog owners. Inadequate street lighting in some streets.
- Everybody in the area complains about dog mess bags not being removed from the streets and taken home. They even put signs on the posts instructing the dog's owners.
- 1. Dog excrement: typically particularly scraped up but their bags left where it is likely to be crushed sometimes in gutter bit of pavement. 2. There is also a problem with clearing up non-resident's litter.
- Dog pollution! Fly parking (strangers parking in my front yard).
- We need more dustbins on the High Street. I also hate dog mess on the streets
 (Abingdon Road) and people should not be allowed to just leave their dog mess in a blue
 bag on the street and please fine people who allow their dogs to mess.
- Dog mess: could the Council provide receptacles "bins" to use rather than plastic bags of mess dropped onto the pavement? Lack of community feel - more short term lets so no stability in make-up area
- (1) Prevent Kensington Gardens being spoilt by events such as The Lion/Witch and Wardrobe. (2) Ensure greenery in our streets is maintained and increased. (3) Stop people leaving dog mess in plastic bags on the streets.
- Since the last month there is more dog poo in the streets of the borough. It will be great if something can be done about it. If nothing is done Kensington and Chelsea will become like Paris pavements.

- Re: rubbish write to each property owner/letter drop to each flat. Other content: outline problem, ask to help solve it, alternative fines.

 close to that intersection.

Traffic is heavy because of the hotels (taxis, large tour buses, construction trucks) and most cars speed around Cheniston Gardens onto Wrights Lane. There is no regard for pedestrians and there is a horrible blind spot as the road turns. Pedestrians are almost struck on a daily basis. It is just a matter of time. A cross walk would allow pedestrians to cross safely and slow down the speed of drivers.
