The next four years

Re-elected Council Leader Cllr Merrick Cockell sketches a vision for the four-year life of the new Council

At local and national level, people have made their voices heard. As a result there is a new Conservative Prime Minister in Downing Street leading a coalition and there will soon be many new faces taking their seats in the chamber here at the Town Hall.

Getting the economy back into shape is going to be the top national priority. Before the election all three main parties were in agreement that severe but undefined public spending reductions would be needed to tackle the fiscal deficit. Local councils, ours included, know they are going to have to bear much of the burden.

We never believed that the days of boom and bust were truly over and we prepared for that by building up our reserves. Although this means we can provide some protection for absolute local priorities, we cannot provide immunity from the necessary changes that are heading our way.

Our council tax remains amongst the lowest in England and we aim to keep it that way, but we know that even well-prepared councils like ours will have to do more than simply tighten their belts. That means we will have to focus resources on essential services rather than what was possible in less austere times. In concentrating on those, we are going to find different, cheaper ways of operating. We will cut our costs before seeking savings in front-line services.

But however tight the public spending squeeze may be, one thing we won't be doing is using that as an excuse to hunker down and stop striving for, and investing in, a better borough.

In the four year life of this new Council, we are going to see the realisation of some longstanding ambitions that are essential for the future of our community. The new Chelsea Academy building, our first new secondary school in 50 years will open in September. Holland Park School is being rebuilt and a stunning new Exhibition Road at the centre of the cultural and academic quarter of South Kensington will be ready to greet the world in 2012.

For historical reasons, the north of the borough has always been less well off than the rest. We must continue to work to remove the opportunity gap between north and south, which is why we are vigorously pursuing a new academy in North Kensington. We know that local children do better when they find a place in a Royal Borough school. As Holland Park School has become more and more popular, its catchment area has become ever smaller and some Royal Borough children are unable to get a place in a high performing local school. We are determined to meet that need.

We also need improved sports and recreation facilities so that people

can take better care of themselves and find positive outlets for their energy. Kensington Sports Centre has seen better days and a new facility next to a new school could provide facilities matching the needs of this century rather than

the last.

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Our ambition for a Crossrail station at Kensal would bring Heathrow, Canary Wharf and the City within easy reach and would trigger a massive redevelopment of the 67-acre gasworks site. That development would bring thousands of new homes and jobs into the borough and connect the most deprived communities to opportunities elsewhere.

Couple all that with the recently-approved redevelopment of the Wornington Green Estate, which will provide improved homes and new shops and jobs in Portobello Road, and we will see real change in the quality of life and opportunities in North Kensington.

But our ambitions for the new Council aren't all about the north of the borough. The owners of Earl's Court Exhibition Centre aim to redevelop it after the 2012 Olympics. We will be fighting to make sure any project brings lasting and major improvements in quality of life for Earl's Court too.

On nearby Warwick Road we will see the development of four separate sites to create many hundreds of new, high quality homes with shops and health and community facilities, plus a new primary school.

As with all ambitions, some will be realised in full, others in part and some not at all. Some may not be affordable for many years.

But without foresight and ambition our community will stagnate. Across the political parties, newly elected councillors are ambitious for our borough and its residents but realistic about the tough times ahead. We are ready for the challenges and opportunities

SHAPING THE FUTURE

Plans that could provide a new secondary school and a new leisure centre in North Kensington have been discussed by the Royal Borough of Kensington

and Chelsea's Cabinet.

Officers have now been asked to look at the feasibility of two options that could see the Kensington Leisure Centre site being used to solve the twin challenges of providing the area with a new academy and rebuilding the ageing leisure centre.

The Council is committed to providing a new secondary school in North Kensington and has commissioned a number of studies to look at the best way of achieving this goal, which is likely to involve using a site that it already owns.

The Cabinet considered two options; building the academy on the site of the external sports pitches and car park or a grander option that would involve using the whole of the leisure centre site to provide a brand new school and leisure centre.

The Council will not make a



decision until the site has been fully assessed, and even then plans for a new school and leisure centre would be subject to the statutory planning process. The Council would also have to be sure that the necessary finances were in place.

Cllr Merrick Cockell, Leader of the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, said: "We have ambitious plans for North Kensington and chief amongst these is to build a fine new secondary school. I know from experience the challenges we will face building a school in such a densely populated borough. This is why we must consult thoroughly with local people and reassure ourselves that any site we choose is the right one."

The Council's consultation with local residents, businesses, stakeholders and others will cover issues such as the location of the school, the future of the leisure centre and what a new centre could offer local people.

On the ball over online fraud

An online fraud that targeted foreign tourists has been uncovered by Kensington and Chelsea Council.

The fraudsters were copying rental listings from legitimate estate agents' websites and then posting them on bogus sites. Tourists who 'booked' one of the flats or apartments in a desirable part of the Royal Borough were asked for payment in advance via money transfer and only realised they had been conned when they tried to collect the keys from a legitimate lettings agency or estate agent.

Trading standards officers uncovered that cyber-criminals were using the websites www.choosencitysapa rtment.com and www.standard londoncity.com to promote bogus properties. Officers traced the scammers to Madeira where the websites were registered.

In January, 16 people turned up at the offices of a legitimate company on Hogarth Road, SW5 asking for the keys to the flats they believed they had reserved. Last summer trading standards officers helped to stop the criminals when a family from Australia became suspicious and asked them to verify one of the websites.

Councillor Julie Mills, Cabinet Member for Environmental Health, said: "In the run up to the Olympics we expect thousands more visitors to the borough, and I urge all tourists who plan on visiting London to be extra vigilant and ensure they only book accommodation via a legitimate company."

Here are the Council's top tips to avoid being conned by bogus rental companies:

- Don't pay for services or goods via money transfer agents.
- Use a credit card when paying over the internet as this can provide insurance against fraud.
- 'Google' the name of the website or agency you plan to use and include the word 'scam' or 'fraud' in the search to check its legitimacy.
- Be wary of spelling mistakes and grammatical errors.
- Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it often is.



Promoting good pubs

The Council is again inviting pubs, bars and clubs in Kensington and Chelsea to enter the annual *Best Bar None* awards, now in their third year.

The award scheme is run in more than 90 council areas throughout Britain and recognises those licensed premises that try hardest to be considerate to their neighbours and have a positive impact in their area.

Applications have been accepted since April and premises will be assessed between July and September, with the judging process looking at a range of criteria including safety, training for staff, security, drugs policy, litter disposal and noise control.

More than a third of Royal Borough premises entered last year's scheme and the Council wants as many pubs, bars and clubs as possible to show themselves at their best. The scheme is supported by Diageo Great Britain and Soundsec Security.

The fabric of business

A group of budding young entrepreneurs enjoyed the chance of a lifetime when they visited the head office of Cath Kidston Ltd and met the face behind the globally successful brand.

Twenty seven young people, aged 16 to 19, were given the chance to visit the Notting Hill office, where they were treated to a VIP tour and spoke to department heads responsible for areas including human resources, finance, marketing and logistics. Highlight of the day was a question and answer session with Cath Kidston herself.

The visit was part of a pilot being run by the Council to help young

people understand how to run their own business by competing for the opportunity to run a market stall on the world famous Portobello Road.

As well as having the opportunity to learn from successful entrepreneurs they are attending a series of workshops in areas such as marketing, environmental health and finance to equip them with the necessary business skills.

Working in groups, the young people will, in July, pitch their idea for a product or service to a panel of 'dragons' who will choose two groups to each receive a £1,000 start-up fund. The budding

entrepreneurs will then trade for a period of up to six months and receive ongoing mentoring to help make their idea a reality.

Cath Kidston Ltd was founded in 1993 when the designer opened a tiny shop in Holland Park. She began by selling the vintage fabrics, wallpapers and brightly painted junk furniture she remembered fondly from her childhood.

Speaking after the visit she said: "We hope the scheme will inspire young people in the local community and encourage entrepreneurial endeavour – and we will be following their progress closely over the coming months."

Cllr Shireen Richie, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, said: "This unique scheme provides young people with practical opportunities to help develop their entrepreneurial skills and enhance their employability.

"Small businesses are the lifeblood of our community and I hope that this scheme inspires some of our young people to start up on their own."

Portobello Road Market has launched many successful entrepreneurial careers. Peter Simon, the chairman of Monsoon, started out in 1972 with a stall on Portobello Road selling hand-knitted coats. The following year the first Monsoon shop was opened in Beauchamp Place in Knightsbridge.



Paddling together

Families from across the borough are pulling together by joining in with kayaking sessions as part of a Council programme to strengthen families.

The sessions are designed to help families stay together and are supervised by a trained instructor and a specialist outreach worker from the Council. They allow family members to have fun and provide an opportunity for them to work through issues in a neutral environment and cope with some of the stresses of family life.

Reactions so far have been very positive with some likening the Thames-based experience to the kind of family holiday they wouldn't normally be able to have.

RESTORED TO FORMER GLORY

The spectacular Leighton House Museum reopened to the public in April after 18 months out of the limelight while refurbishment was carried out.

The newly-opened museum is currently showing a special exhibition of works from Leighton's own fascinating collection of paintings and sculpture, including important loans from the National Gallery, Tate and National Portrait Gallery.

The reopening follows a survey in 2006 that showed the electrical wiring, fire and intruder detection systems and central heating all needed upgrading. While the building was closed for the practical work, Kensington and Chelsea Council took the opportunity to revisit the decoration and presentation of the house.

Frederic Leighton (1830 to 1896),

eminent painter and President of the Royal Academy, was the only person ever to live in the house in Holland Park Road. It opened to the public as a Museum in 1900 but the original decoration was gradually eroded through the first part of the twentieth century. It is only since the early 1980s that experts have been working on reinstating the original decoration and re-establishing the character of the interiors.

A number of specialist manufacturers have recreated the wall coverings in the Silk Room and Dining Room, as well as the soft furnishings throughout the house. Original architectural features, like fire places removed in the twentieth century, have been put back.

The special launch exhibition includes works by Constable, Corot, Tintoretto, Millais and Delacroix, with the paintings hanging in their original locations for the first time since 1896. An exciting programme of exhibitions and events has been planned to

bring the spectacular house to life now it is open once again.



TRIBUTE

Antony Carr-Gomm, who served as a Councillor for Abingdon Ward for 11 years, from October 1975 until May 1986, has died.

Born in 1918, former Royal Engineers officer Antony Carr-Gomm was coauthor of The Military on English Waterways, an account of the way the canal network was used to move British troops.

As a Councillor, he served on the Libraries and General Service Committee, the Joint Works Committee and the Social Services and Town Planning Committees. He represented the Council on a range of outside organisations and was for many years a familiar face at St. Mary Abbots Church, where he served as a sidesman.

The Mayor of the Royal Borough, Cllr Timothy Coleridge, attended a memorial service at St. Mary Abbots Church on Tuesday 23 February and conveyed the Council's condolences to his wife Jean and his family.

Skillful conversion

Basements used for decades as storage and for housing mechanical plant have been restored to residential use, thanks to the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea.

The redevelopment at Elm Park Gardens in the heart of Chelsea has provided 36 high quality new homes, 23 for sale and 13 for affordable rent.

The properties fell into disrepair during the war years and were compulsorily purchased by Chelsea Borough Council in 1949, by which time the basements were already vacant. Over time they came to house communal heating systems, ducting, electricity units and other equipment. Some parts were three studios, 16 one-bedroom flats, two two-bedroom flats and two three-bedroom flats. Not only will the proceeds of their sale fund the social housing element of the scheme, the flats themselves will help meet the strong demand for homes in Chelsea.

CHAIN REACTION

Expect more cyclists on London's roads from 30 July when the Mayor of London launches his London Cycle Hire scheme.

The Royal Borough is playing its part in making sure that the bicycles will be widely available and has given planning consent to 48 cycle hire docking stations in the borough.

Work to install the docking stations is now well underway and the foundations, which take about ten days to lay, have been completed at many of the sites. Serco, the company responsible for installing the docking stations, will be writing to residents who live close to the remaining sites before they begin work on the final docking stations.

The next phase of the construction will be the installation of the docking points and payment terminals and this will be done shortly before the scheme launches in July.

From early June, cycle training will be available to all those that live, work and study in the borough, using the London Cycle Hire bicycles. To book a training session, please email the borough's Road Safety and Travel Plan team on road.safety@rbkc.gov.uk.

TfL will set up a dedicated Cycle Hire website a few weeks before the launch so users will be able to find out more about how everything will work and how to register to use the bikes. Transport for London will also be launching a number of road shows across the scheme area over the coming months. A LIFE-SAVING VISIT

The value of fire safety visits carried out by firefighters across London was brought home in January when a blaze broke out in the bedroom of a Kensington tower block resident.

Mrs Sandra Diment, who is hard of hearing and lives on the sixth floor, escaped injury thanks to advice provided at one of the thousands of home fire safety visits carried out each year.

During these visits, firefighters look for potential fire hazards and advise people about how to reduce or prevent the risk of fire. They also explain the importance of having an escape plan to use in an emergency. Where appropriate, firefighters will fit free smoke alarms.

John Calvert, Station Manager at Chelsea Fire Station, explained that when they visited the home where Mrs Diment lives with her daughter, the firefighters noticed she was hard of hearing.

"Because of that they fitted a

specialist smoke alarm that is especially designed for the deaf and hard of hearing. These are much louder than standard alarms and can be wired up to a vibrating pad in the person's pillow. We also gave her some important fire safety advice."

During the early hours of January this year a serious fire broke out in the bedroom of her flat. The smoke alarm alerted Mrs Diment and her daughter to the fire and they followed the advice they had been given to close the bedroom door and leave the flat.

Four fire engines and around 20 firefighters tackled the blaze, and while her daughter received treatment for slight smoke inhalation, Mrs Diment was not injured.

Although her bedroom was damaged, Mrs Diment is very aware that it could have been far worse without the special smoke alarm.

Stay safe on two wheels

For many young people a scooter is the first vehicle they will use on the roads, but while they can open up opportunities for work, study and leisure, they can also be dangerous in untrained hands.

For the past two years the Council, in partnership with the Connexions service, has been offering youth organisations the chance to help young people be safer and more skilled when they take to the streets on a powered two wheeler.

The Transit Project enables youth groups to attend a short series of road safety workshops and a day of practical training designed to help youngsters become safe and properly-trained riders.

Amongst those who attended recently were the project's first all-girl group, from Lancaster and Earl's Court Youth Centres, and youngsters from the Moroccan Community Welfare Group who made up the first group in which every participant successfully passed the Compulsory Basic Training (CBT) element of the course.

Closing advice

Although closing the doors at night is still the best way to contain a blaze, changes to building regulations mean self-closing devices no longer have to be fitted to certain fire-resisting doors in new buildings.

The change only affects houses and flats built since 2006. Entrance doors to flats and integral garages still have to have a self-closing device.

Keep safe at night by closing doors to rooms that contain a potential fire risk and fitting smoke detectors to halls and stairways.

Tackling crime

DON'T LOSE IT - LOCK IT

Love it? Then lock it. That's the message from the Council and police this summer as they remind residents to protect their homes and vehicles.

Posters and adverts highlighting the Love it Lock it campaign will urge residents across the borough to lock all windows and doors, especially if they are going on holiday, and keep their vehicles secure.

Targeting residential burglary is a priority – and one where joint work by the Council and the police is already making a difference. Between April 2009 and April 2010 there were 921 offences – 89 fewer than in 2008-09, representing a fall of 8.8 per cent.

The Council's Community Safety Team scheme Safe as Houses aims to reduce burglary and protect the homes of vulnerable residents by providing security works and preventative measures in what is known as 'target hardening'.

Here are some simple steps you can take to protect your home and car and make the most of the summer.

Home security

Don't leave windows open and doors unlocked when you are in your garden enjoying the hot weather.

Don't leave valuable items such as laptops, smartphones and music/video players next to open windows or in view of passers-by.

If you are out of the house all day, or you are going away, try to make it look as if someone is at home and don't advertise your absence.

Use timer switches to turn on lights, radios and other appliances while you are away.

If possible ask a friend or neighbour to collect your post, open and close your curtains, park in your drive and make your home look lived in.

Remember to cancel milk and newspapers.

Protect your vehicle

Always keep your vehicle locked.

Don't leave items on display in your vehicle and take all your belongings with you when you leave the car.

Remove portable satnav devices when the vehicle is parked and remove any sign that they have been used.

Don't leave keys on view at home or in the vehicle.

Consider fitting anti-theft or aftertheft security systems and fit locking wheel nuts.

Always use your garage if you have one and lock both your vehicle and your garage. If you don't have a garage, try to park in a well-lit, open place.

Use a secure motorcycle or scooter cover to reduce the temptation to steal your vehicle. If you have a parking permit for your two-wheeler, use the ground anchors provided at the designated parking bays located across the borough.

Beware the scammers

Elderly residents have been encouraged to watch out for bogus callers and scammers through a series of road shows and role-playing scenarios.

The Safe and Sure Road Shows for Older People programme was aimed at making older people, particularly those living alone, more aware of scams and bogus callers as well as building their confidence to take action and avoid becoming a victim. The message "If it is too good to be true, then it probably is" was used to remind them to act cautiously.

A special Action against burglary road show that travelled across the borough throughout February and March was organised by Age Concern Kensington and

Chelsea, in partnership with the Council's Community Safety Team, Trading Standards, the Safer Neighbourhoods Team, Age UK and the Home Office.

The free event featured video footage, advice and role-playing scenarios brought to life by Cllr Pat Mason and Ivanhoe Norona.

Cllr Mason, who represents Golborne ward, said: "Elderly residents can often find themselves being targeted by bogus sales people, fake lottery letters and telephone scams.

"The road shows demonstrated how older residents can get wise to the scams and avoid being conned by unscrupulous con artists."

go-ride

Youngsters will be getting on their bikes to take part in a cycle competition organised by the Royal Borough's Parks Police and the Council.

On Saturday 29 May, from noon to 3pm, youngsters aged from eight to 14 will be using pedal power to take part in a variety of cycling activities, including obstacle and circuit racing, at Little Wormwood Scrubs.

The event is being sponsored by the British Cycling Association's Go-Ride scheme which aims to improve competitive cycling for eight to 14 year olds as well as discovering and supporting future cycling champions.

Winners will receive medals and the chance to represent the Royal Borough in the forthcoming London Youth Games.

ACTION CONTINUES

The police and Kensington and Chelsea Council are continuing to tackle aggressive begging in south Kensington after being granted a new Group Dispersal Order for a further six months.

The new order follows the success of the Group Dispersal Zone introduced in Brompton ward in April 2009.

The powers are designed to tackle problems caused by aggressive begging and antisocial behaviour and have so far been used by the police to move 214 people on from the area for 24 hours. To date, two people have been arrested for breaching the dispersal regulations.

Police officers have worked with the Council to gain six ASBOs (Antisocial Behaviour Orders) against some prolific offenders.

The police led the application for the dispersal zone with the Council's support in response to complaints from residents and businesses.

Anyone breaking the rules of the dispersal zone can be arrested and face three months imprisonment and a fine of up to £2,000.

Sector Inspector for Chelsea, Sean Flynn, said: "There has been a noticeable decrease in the numbers of beggars on the Brompton ward. The numerous dispersals, stops and arrests coupled with the impact of ASBOs have shown that begging will not be tolerated.

"The dispersal powers have made a visible difference in combating this problem."



Safe ride for passengers

A dedicated team has been set up to tackle transport crime in the borough as part of the Mayor of London's pledge to tackle antisocial behaviour on public transport.

In April, the team of 21 police community support officers (PCSOs), six constables and three sergeants started working on buses throughout Kensington and Chelsea to help reduce bus-related crime and antisocial behaviour and help passengers feel safer.

The Safer Transport Team is also responsible for dealing with road congestion, tackling road safety issues such as dangerous cycling and preventing illegal taxi touting, as well as supporting the borough's 18 Safer Neighbourhoods Teams.

Inspector Graham Sutherland, who is heading up the new team, said: "I am responsible for leading a team of dedicated officers whose sole role is to provide a safe transport system for passengers and staff in the borough. The team is highly visible and the officers will provide greater reassurance for passengers and build confidence in what is already a very safe transport system."

Royal Borough people

Recognising those who help

Each year the Mayor of Kensington and Chelsea recognises local people who have made a difference within their communities. These are residents or people who work in the borough who have been nominated by members of the public for their work and commitment to making life in Kensington and Chelsea even better.

At this year's presentation evening in March, eight residents received a Mayor's Award. Royal Borough spoke to one of them, Miss Frankie Strinati, who received a Mayor's Award in recognition of her work at Tamezin Club, a youth club for girls aged six to 25 in Chelsea.

During term time, Frankie spends every Saturday at *Tamezin*, working as a youth leader and training new volunteers to work with young people.

How long have you been part of Tamezin?

Almost 14 years; I became part of the team when I was 18 and have been there ever since. I know it's a long time but I just love working with the girls. It's fun and really rewarding. I wouldn't do it if I didn't enjoy it.

What do you do there?

I get involved in everything. There's sport, dance and drama and I also act as a mentor in one-to-one sessions. We also do lots of group activities and encourage the girls to volunteer too.

It's mostly about having fun, but some girls struggle with low selfesteem or other problems and we're well equipped to give emotional support too. We encourage them to stretch themselves and take a risk; seeing someone go from having almost no confidence to performing in front of 100 people is really inspiring. I learn a lot from them, too.

So it's a real community spirit?

Of course! I've been there so long that I'm now working with the children of people I worked with years ago. I stay in touch with many of them, so for me Tamezin is a bit like an extended family. I get to reminisce with so many people about the experience of growing up in London. I'm told I have a youthful spirit so I guess people feel like I'm doing a good job.

How do you feel about your award?

I was so surprised when I found out, but when I read what people had said in my nomination I was very moved. As I said, I do this because I love it, but to realise that I have made such a difference is really special. Thank you to the Mayor of Kensington and Chelsea for organising the event - it was great to find out about the work being done all over the borough.

MOVING FORWARD


Eight hyper-acute specialist stroke units and four specialist trauma units have been created in London as part of a major change in the way the NHS delivers healthcare.

A specialist paediatric surgery for North West London is now based at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, and more changes are planned as the NHS moves away from costly acute hospitals by providing centres in the primary sector instead.

"We all know that some accident and emergency units can be overwhelmed with long waiting times," commented the Royal Borough's scrutiny chairman Cllr Christopher Buckmaster.

"Many patients could be better off going to a local GP's surgery, backed up by appropriate diagnostic facilities, rather than clogging up expensive hospital provision.

"The plans are for up to 60 per cent of unplanned treatment and up to 30 per cent of outpatient activity to move from hospitals



into the community. As well as delivering valuable cost savings, this will mean providing healthcare closer to patients' homes, shorter waiting times and more facilities available in primary care centres."

The new Community hospital at St Charles will provide not just GPs, dentists and a pharmacy but a wide range of diagnostic facilities previously only available from acute hospitals.

The new Earl's Court centre will be opening shortly and will be linked to neighbouring doctors and offer a wide range of services, while a new Urgent Care Centre planned for the Chelsea and Westminster hospital will provide similar facilities.

NEW SYSTEM WILL LEAD TO MORE EFFICIENT CARE

Summary

Records

Patients in The Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea can expect more efficient health care services with the introduction of NHS summary care records. will receive information about how summary care records work and will be given the option of not having one.

A summary care record is a secure electronic way of recording patients' key information such as allergy details, current prescriptions and bad reactions to medicines.

The information can be shared between health care staff so that vital information about the patient is at hand during treatment or in a medical emergency.

All residents aged 16 and over who are registered with GP practices

A summary care record is only accessible by staff directly involved in a patient's treatment. Details about patients who choose not to be part of the scheme will

be recorded as before.

GARDEN WASTE

Residents who belong to the Council's garden waste scheme should by now have received their new calendar listing collection dates through to March 2011.

The free garden waste scheme operates all year round and provides a collection once every two weeks. Please place your garden waste out for collection on the day shown in your calendar.

Anyone who signs up to the service will receive a hard-wearing garden waste bag in which to store their garden waste. Extra bags are available at £2 each and residents can also buy biodegradable garden waste bags at £7.50 for 25. Please note that garden waste will only be collected in the

garden waste bag or the biodegradable bags – not in any other container.

Residents can dispose of leaves, grass cuttings, weeds, flowers, old garden or house plants, twigs and hedge trimmings. Please make sure your garden waste bag(s) are visible from the kerb and can easily be spotted by a collector walking or driving past.

Cheaper pest control

Do you run a business in Kensington and Chelsea?

The Royal Borough's Environmental Health Service is launching a new pest audit service to help businesses keep their premises pest-free without the need for expensive pest control contracts.

Many businesses are paying, year after year, for pest control services they may not necessarily need.

The new pest audit service will, for a reasonable charge, survey your business premises for pests such as mice, rats, bedbugs and cockroaches and the conditions in which infestations could occur.

If you do have a problem, the Council's pest control officers can deal with it for you quickly and at a competitive rate. If we find you don't have any infestation, we will give you advice on any necessary housekeeping or other work that you may need to do to remain pest free; all you have

to pay for is the cost of the survey.

The service costs from just £199 for a small shop, office or home increasing with the size of the premises. Each survey includes a comprehensive report on the situation at the time the survey was carried out, as well as advice on how to prevent pests from finding their way into the site.

Those who use the service also qualify for a free place on one of the Council's pest awareness training courses.

TOO BIG

Residents with items that are too big or bulky for a normal refuse bag or bin can now use the Council's online *Too Big for the Bin* service.

The Too Big for the Bin service will collect up to ten items, from domestic properties only, for just £23.30. The service is ideal for things like old furniture, mattresses, bed frames and cookers. Fridges and freezers are collected free of charge in all cases.

To book a collection please log onto www.rbkc.gov.uk to choose a slot and pay by debit or credit card. Alternatively, call Streetline on 020 7361 3001 with your credit or debit card details to hand.

Please allow seven days from the date of your booking and note that the *Too Big for the Bin* crew will not collect garden waste, car parts or builders' waste.

The Council recommends that residents try to reuse or repair old items or donate them to charity before using this service.

GO GREEN - SAVE CASH

Businesses can enhance their green credentials by taking advantage of the recycling service offered by the Council.

Kensington and Chelsea Council can provide an office recycling box designed specifically to give businesses a simple way of sorting recycling from general waste.

The recycling box is designed to be used with orange recycling bags; simply place one of the bags into the box so that staff can recycle paper, cardboard, tins, cans, glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, food and drink cartons and empty aerosols in the one place.

When the bag is full, simply lift it out of the box and take it to your nearest outdoor recycling bank. The office recycling box does away with the need for segregated recycling containers around the office and offers a tidier solution to recycling at work.

It makes sense for businesses to recycle as it costs less to send a bag of recyclable materials to be recycled than it does to send a bag of rubbish to landfill. It is estimated that a business that chooses to recycle can save as much as £500 per year.

Working together to recycle

The council has provided more than 600 mixed recycling banks to give residents on estates or in mansion blocks somewhere to take their recyclable items.

It means that those living in estates around the borough should have easy access to facilities for recycling paper, cardboard, tins, cans, glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, food and drink cartons and empty aerosols.

Residents are asked to wash out anything that has contained food or drink, and crush cardboard. Recycling can be placed loose into a mixed recycling bank and there is no need to use orange recycling bags. The

orange lids on mixed recycling banks are kept locked in order to prevent contamination.

Although these mixed recycling banks are emptied once a week, they can get full quite quickly and the Council asks residents not to leave bags of recycling (or rubbish) around, or on top of, them.

Leaving bags of recycling and/or rubbish around the banks is unsightly, can attract vermin and can encourage other people to dump even more rubbish which can lead to an eyesore for local residents.

If your nearest recycling bank gets full quickly, please call Streetline on **020 7361 3001** to let the Council know. The Recycling Team can then increase the amount of banks

available to give residents proper access to the recycling service.

Residents who find their mixed recycling bank is full should try to use the next nearest bank or visit the nearest mini recycling centre. For a list of mini recycling centres see www.rbkc.gov.uk or telephone Streetline on 020 7361 3001.



Scoop or you'll face £80 fine

Dog owners are being reminded to scoop their dog's poop or face a fine.

New signs are going up across the borough to inform residents that once they've scooped up their dog's poop they should place it in a bin. Residents should not leave bags of dog mess on the road,

beside trees, lamp-posts or any other place on the public highway for street sweepers to clear up.

Getting it wrong could leave your bank balance in a mess, with anyone who fails to pick up their dog's poop or dispose of it in a bin facing an on-the-spot fine of £80.




