IMPLEMENTING THE STRATEGIES: CLUSTER CHAMPIONS

This paper reports on progress in identifying cluster champions and cluster co-ordinators.

Items for action for members of the steering group are highlighted in **bold**.

FOR APPROVAL

BACKGROUND

At its January meeting the steering group approved a Strategies Implementation Plan (see Appendix 1 of agenda paper 4), and agreed for it to be submitted to the Government Office for London as part of the Partnership's Accreditation Action Plan.

The Strategies Implementation Plan introduced the concepts of *cluster champions* and *cluster co-ordinators*, and of cluster-specific *progress trackers* as the mechanism for monitoring progress on implementation of the actions in the Community and Neighbourhood Renewal strategies.

CLUSTER CHAMPIONS

Each of the seven themes or clusters will have two cluster champions on the steering group.

The proposed role of cluster champions is to:

- Bring to the attention of the steering group any matters, particularly of a cross-cutting nature, which are inhibiting implementation of actions or developments on which their cluster is leading or has an interest;
- Lead or facilitate cross-agency meetings / events to promote and / or remove blockages;
- Publicise the achievements of the cluster and LSP;
- Introduce new ideas for the consideration of the steering group;
- Present to the steering group a summary of progress relating to cluster activities, as part of the annual review of the Community / Neighbourhood Renewal strategies.

At the end of the January meeting Councillor Paget-Brown circulated a form for members of the steering group to indicate which of the themes they were most interested in championing. Replies are set out in **Annex 1**. This shows a good spread of self-nominations across the clusters with the exception of *Homes and housing* for which there no first-choice volunteers. By contrast,

four members expressed a preference to champion *Health and well-being*. Both *Learning*, *leisure and arts* and *Work and business* had one first preference only.

All members are asked to consider whether they would be willing to champion the *Homes and housing* cluster instead of their first choice.

The steering group is requested, at the meeting, to agree the names of two champions for as many of the clusters as possible.

CLUSTER CO-ORDINATORS

The proposed role of cluster co-ordinators, working through the Strategies Implementation Group, is to:

- Promote the objectives of neighbourhood renewal, particularly the mainstreaming of NRF-supported initiatives;
- Support the Cluster Champions by monitoring delivery, progress and performance of the strategies through maintenance of *progress trackers*;
- Collate performance data against activities;
- Co-ordinate the annual review of the strategies for presentation to the KCP steering group in June (CS) and September (NRS).

Overall co-ordination of the completion of progress trackers would be undertaken by the Strategies Implementation Group of executive officers from across the Partnership.

Again, it is suggested that each cluster has two co-ordinators. The right hand column of **Annex 1** lists agreed and potential cluster co-ordinators. While the Council could nominate one cluster co-ordinator against each of the clusters, it would be desirable for the second co-ordinator to be from a different organisation. **Members are requested to consider additional nominations as cluster co-ordinators from their own or partner organisations.**

CLUSTER PRIORITIES – HEADLINE INITIATIVES

Appendix 2 of the Strategies Implementation Plan listed by cluster a selection of 'headline initiatives' included in the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy, plus priorities proposed by steering group members following the December meeting. This table has been reformatted to show these additional priorities against the most appropriate cluster. (**Annex 2**)

Once the progress tracker has been updated, cluster champions may wish to revisit and amend this selection of priorities, as part of the Year 1 Annual Review of the two strategies.
