

KENSINGTON AND CHELSEA PARTNERSHIP**19th MARCH 2003****YEAR 1 REVIEW OF THE COMMUNITY STRATEGY AND THE
NEIGHBOURHOOD RENEWAL STRATEGY**

The paper presents an approach to the Year 1 review of the Partnership's three-year strategies, and a suggested timetable of activities.

FOR APPROVAL**Background**

Work on both the Community Strategy (CS) and Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy (NRS) began in the autumn of 2001, with contributions from a wide range of organisations represented by the steering group.

Extensive public consultation and research took place over the next six months and the findings were distilled in the compilation of Area Profiles to provide a snapshot of the Royal Borough as at 31 March 2002.

The steering group approved the Community Strategy, *The Future of Our Community*, in June 2002 and the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy in September 2002, under the title *Renewing Our Neighbourhoods*.

The two strategies are complementary. They are arranged around the same common themes or clusters:

- Environment and transport
- Health and well-being
- Homes and housing
- Learning and leisure
- Safe communities
- Work and business

An additional theme in the NRS is Community Development, including the sharing of skills and knowledge.

Whereas the Community Strategy presents the broad vision and borough-wide actions, the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy relates these to the different localities of the borough and to specific action in these areas.

Both strategies run for three years. The steering group is committed to undertake an annual review of the strategies.

Since publication, the actions and targets contained in both strategies have been reformatted in 'progress trackers', one for each of theme or cluster.

Suggested Approach

The **attached schedule** describes how the steering group might wish to handle the Year 1 review of the strategies. It is based on the following assumptions:

1. In 2005, one strategy should replace the existing two. In effect, the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy is a subset of the overall Community Strategy,
2. The Year 1 review should be largely concerned with auditing progress on implementing the actions contained in the strategies.
3. The review should focus on the seven themes or clusters, with cluster champions introducing brief summaries of progress to the steering group, based on the completion of the progress trackers.
4. The review should:
 - identify **issues** preventing implementation of particular objectives and actions;
 - confirm or adjust the **priorities** to be adopted over the year ahead;
 - identify **new opportunities** which have arisen since the production of the strategies.
5. The main products of the review should be:
 - a completed progress tracker for each cluster, with summary page on priorities, issues and new opportunities
 - a brief and easy to read report for general distribution
