## Real world testing

Earlier this year we told you that we were going to work with Guide Dogs for the Blind Association to ensure Exhibition Road is truly accessible to everyone. Guide Dogs have voiced their concerns about the effectiveness of the corduroy tactile paving being used to mark the pedestrian

zones. Even though the corduroy paving has been vigorously tested under laboratory conditions they are anxious that it may not perform as well in real life in certain circumstances. To make sure we are absolutely confident that it will do its job, we have appointed consultants to carry out real world testing in situ in Exhibition Road.

They will test whether the corduroy paving can be detected in an on-street environment by people who are blind or partially sighted especially when approached from an acute angle, and that it is easy to pass over by people with mobility impairments. A group of volunteers, including members of the Exhibition Road Access Group will be carrying out the tests on 16 and 17 December, weather permitting, and completing them in mid February next year.

This newsletter is delivered to all homes, businesses and organisations in the Exhibition Road area. Every month we will let you know how the project is progressing, as well as introducing you to some of the people and the work they are carrying out on this £25 million project.
