

Marriage Ceremony

Welcome and Introduction

Good Morning / Afternoon to everyone present today. On behalf of ______ and _____, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you the warmest welcome to the *Chelsea Old Town Hall* here in the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea for this very special occasion: their marriage ceremony.

My name is _____, and as a Deputy Superintendent Registrar for the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, it is my privilege and pleasure to be leading you through this ceremony today. With me is my colleague, _____, the (deputy) registrar of marriages, who will record the details of this marriage in the register and assist the couple and witnesses with the signing.

This place in which we are met has been duly sanctioned according to law for the celebration of marriages and civil partnerships. We are gathered here today to witness the joining in matrimony of ______ and _____, in *(registrar confirms name of venue on authorities)*, and if any person here present knows of any lawful impediment to this marriage, they should declare this now.

Thank you. Through their vows, ______ and _____ are making a commitment to each other for the rest of their lives. They are offering to each other the security that comes from legally binding vows, sincerely made and faithfully kept. Through your presence here today, as their family and friends, you are expressing your love and support for them at this very special occasion.

Now, as there have been no objections to your marriage we may now proceed with the ceremony and registration.

The civil ceremony is split into three parts. The first is when ______ and _____ declare that there is no legal reason why they cannot be married today. They will then say the contracting words to each other, joining them in union as husband/wife and husband/wife, and finally they will exchange rings.

______ and _____, we celebrate with you today. We are glad to join with you in the solemnisation of your marriage, to witness your vows and to support you in your intentions for your future life together.

The symbolic vows that you are about to make acknowledge that you are crossing a new threshold in your lives together. For, from today, you shall say to the world: "We are married – this is my husband, this is my wife".

Vows

..... and before you are joined in matrimony I have to remind you of the solemn and binding character of the vows you are about to make. Marriage in this country means the union of two people, voluntarily entered into, for life, to the exclusion of all others.

I am now going to ask each of you in turn to declare that there is no reason why you may not marry each other.

Please repeat after me:

TRADITIONAL VOWS (A)

MODERN VOWS (B)

I declare / that I know / of no legal reason / why I _____ / may not be joined in marriage / to _____.

SIMPLIFIED VOWS (C)

Registrar asks:

"Are you ______ free lawfully to marry _____?"

Bride/Groom replies "I am".

We have now reached the solemn moment when _____ and _____ will contract their marriage before you, their witnesses gathered here today. Would you all please stand.

And so I ask you now:

_____, do you take ______ to be your lawful husband/wife; do you promise to love, cherish and respect him/her for the rest of your lives together? [Response: I do]

And _____, do you take _____ to be your lawful husband/wife; do you promise to love, cherish and respect him/her for the rest of your lives together? [Response: I do]

Thank you. Please now turn to face each other and repeat after me:

TRADITIONAL VOWS (A)

I call upon / these persons here present / to witness that I _____ / do take thee _____ / to be my lawfully wedded wife / husband.

MODERN VOWS (B)

I ______ take thee ______ to be my wedded wife / husband.

SIMPLIFIED VOWS (C)

I ______ take you ______ to be my wedded wife / husband.

Exchange of Rings

The wedding ring is the ancient and traditional way of sealing the marriage contract that you have both just made. It is an unbroken circle which symbolises unending and everlasting love and is an outward sign of the vows and the life-long promises that you have made to one another today.

Please repeat after me:

I give you this ring / as a symbol of our marriage / and as a token of my love, now and always.

Ceremony Conclusion

______ and ______ you have both made the solemn and binding vows and declarations prescribed by the law of this country. You have sealed your vows by the joining together of hands and the giving and receiving of rings in the presence of your family and friends gathered here today.

Today will be a milestone in your lives that you will look back upon with love and happiness and we hope that the feelings of love that you have for each other will deepen and grow stronger throughout the years to come.

And so, it now gives me great pleasure to say congratulations to you both and to declare that under the law of this country you are now legally united in marriage. (Optional: You may kiss.)
