Conflict in the Middle East

Cllr Elizabeth Campbell has shared her thoughts and condolences over the conflict between Israel and Hamas, affecting Palestine.

She said: "First and foremost, our own communities here in Kensington and Chelsea are our main priority. There is a wider conflict and history – decades long – and now there is the growing complexity of what is happening across the Middle East. With strong views on all sides.

"We all want to minimise the loss of human life, that has to be the priority for all sides, and I am in contact with leaders of different faiths. We will work with organisations of all beliefs to promote community cohesion and build relationships."

She added: "It is a stark reminder of how global geopolitics impacts us locally, we see it in the lives of our own citizens and our own workforce. We have reports of people stuck in Gaza or in Israel and impacted directly by the fighting, we know people who have lost loved ones and people who are searching for the missing.

"At the last full council meeting, I spoke in detail about one of our main Council Plan themes, safer. It feels more important than ever."

The Grenfell Tower Memorial Commission's recommendations for a future memorial

On 14 November, the independent Commission published its second report, Remembering Grenfell: Recommendations and next steps to a memorial. This report covers almost four years of work by the Commission, to understand the Grenfell community's wishes for a fitting and beautiful memorial to all those that were tragically lost.

This report is an important and necessary step in taking the community's vision for a future memorial and turning it into a reality. The next phase will involve the selection of a design team and the development of memorial design options, before proceeding towards the building of a memorial. When that happens, it will be based on a design that has had the community's involvement from the very beginning.

In November, the Commission wrote to the Grenfell community, expressing gratitude to

those who have given their time and views. This has enabled the Commission to develop the vision for a memorial and the recommendations within its report.

Key workers move in as first new homes delivered

Key workers are moving into brand-new homes in the heart of the communities they serve following completion of the first properties delivered through our new homes programme.

Workers from sectors including healthcare, teaching and the emergency services are now calling North Kensington home following the opening of 15-17 Hewer Street, which provides 10 affordable rented homes for key workers along with 10 properties at market rent.

The opening of the development, which boasts air-sourced heat pumps, improved insulation and fire safety measures including sprinklers, was marked by the presentation of artwork created by pupils from neighbouring Barlby Primary School celebrating the role of key workers to their community.

Lilly Joseph, an NHS key worker who grew up in Kensington and Chelsea and has now moved into Hewer Street, said:

"I am delighted to have been considered to live at Hewer Street. This will be life-changing for me in many ways and allows me to set up home in the borough, providing me with a secure base to continue to serve the people of Kensington and Chelsea."

The Hewer Street development retains the original building's façade to match the character of the area and includes a plaque recognising that the coffin of the Unknown Warrior was constructed on the site by John Nodes Funeral Service, a local firm which is still based in the area.

Playing for London Capital FC, a grassroots football club in North Kensington, Ahmed's skill and dedication was soon spotted by the club's coach and director, Ali Sharif.

Ahmed was taken by his coach to football trials during the October half-term, where his talent and determination caught the eye of scouts from several Premier League clubs, including West Ham United FC, who have since offered him a place at their youth academy.



Ahmed shared his excitement about the news, saying: *"I am very happy that I got scouted by a top Premier League football academy, and I'm grateful to my coaches at London Capital FC for helping me to improve my football skills and my mental strength."*

Ahmed's coach, Ali Sharif, said: *"I have no doubt that Ahmed will rise through the ranks, and he will surely make it to the first team. We will continue to support Ahmed through any challenges he faces."*

Helping young people with the cost of living

Over 100 young people in Kensington and Chelsea have been awarded grants of up to £250 in vouchers to support with the cost of living. The £40k fund, made available by the Kensington and Chelsea Youth Council, gave young people the opportunity to apply for a grant to pay for school supplies, winter clothing, travel, hygiene products and more.

The funding pot was initially for £20,000 but was doubled to £40,000 by the Youth Council following high demand. A panel of Youth Fund Assessors worked through the high volume of applications in order to award the funding.

Amy Chuang, mother of 17-year-old Rosslyn, said: *“I heard about the grants through the Council e-newsletter and realised Rosslyn was eligible. The money will really help with the cost of travel, giving her independence, and with the cost of school supplies for her studies this year.*

“Parents are really struggling at the moment, and these grants give young people some independence to start spending and budgeting for their own supplies and needs, while also taking some of the financial pressure off parents.”

Erfan Zarenia, aged 16, who moved to the UK in 2018 and is studying maths, economics, and geography, said: *“I’ve just started year 12 and there’s a lot I need to buy like school supplies, textbooks and equipment. This grant will help me afford the things I need to do well.”*

Successful pilot reduces school exclusions

The North Kensington Inclusion Pilot team has been recognised for its work at the Council’s Staff Awards for championing equality, diversity, and inclusion.

The pilot aimed to promote inclusion in local secondary schools and combat exclusion in the interest of finding solutions to children’s problems and keeping them in education.

It did this by embedding family workers in schools, providing training to those working with families, and by offering specialised advice to parents and carers.

The programme also offers access to independent advice and advocacy from ClementJames and Coram.

Since the pilot launched in April 2022, 76 per cent of secondary school pupils have engaged with the embedded worker, resulting in a significant reduction in their risk of exclusion, with 93 per cent of primary school pupils seeing the same.

Residents thanked for helping to drive up Council customer service

Residents who have given their time over the past year to co-design a new set of Council Service Standards were celebrated at an event in North Kensington.

The seven residents have been working closely with the Council to create the standards which will improve the service residents receive when they contact us. They were invited to a thank you event where they were recognised for their input, time and dedication.

Kensington and Chelsea Council is the first Council to co-design organisation-wide Service Standards with its residents, supporting our ongoing commitment to becoming a caring and competent Council.

The group has been meeting since summer 2022 and collectively drafted the standards before they were consulted on earlier this year with staff and residents.

The standards are being rolled out across the Council through several face-to-face sessions with different teams. Leaders from across the organisation have also made commitments about how the service standards will be embedded, and how progress will be monitored.

The Service Standards are segmented into three parts – how residents want to feel when they contact the Council, what the Council needs to do to achieve that and what staff and services need to do.

Demir Timuray, 21, a co-design panel member, said: *“I think we should all feel proud. This is our product. We have come together in the space of a year to criticise the Council on what needs to be addressed, what we feel the gaps are in the system and what can be developed to tailor the system to what residents need.*

The fact that these are our words shows that the Council has listened to us. In terms of accountability, the most tangible thing we can do as residents, is follow up what the Council is doing, highlight when we still experience a problem and see if any changes are being made.”

They look at ensuring staff listen and deal empathetically with residents' enquiries, proactively update residents with progress on their enquiry every step of the way and take responsibility.
