Register to vote ahead of local elections

The local borough elections are on Thursday 5 May 2022. This is your chance to vote for your local ward councillor. Details on all the candidates standing in the election will be published on our website.

A councillor's primary role is to represent their ward and the people who live in it. They provide a bridge between the community and the Council. So, if you want your voice to be heard, make sure you are registered to vote.

The last date to register to vote is **Thursday 14 April** and the quickest way to do this is online at **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote**

If you want to apply for a postal vote or need to amend your current one, you have until 5pm on **Tuesday 19 April**.

If you are unable to vote in person but would like someone to do this on your behalf, you have until 5pm on **Tuesday 26 April** to apply for a proxy vote.

Carve out a career in construction at the Building Lives Academy

An academy dedicated to teaching young people in Kensington and Chelsea the skills they need for careers in construction is open for applications.

The Building Lives Academy, based in North Kensington, is an 11-week programme designed to prepare 16-to-24-year-old residents of the borough for a move into an apprenticeship, job or higher-level training in construction or logistics.

Trainees are fully funded and can gain qualifications in areas including construction skills, health and safety and employability as well as benefiting from on-site experience, access to personal branding workshops and the chance to learn maths, English and digital skills.

The Academy launched in January 2022 from Kensington and Chelsea Council-owned premises provided to Willmott Dixon under a social investment lease. Tower site update

As part of the ongoing works to keep the tower safe and stable, additional metal supports or 'props' are being installed in the tower. The next phase of works will extend these into the basement and include putting in a small lift through the west side of the tower at basement level so that heavy equipment can be removed.

Small sections of the outer tower wrapping may need to be briefly removed and replaced to fit the lift. The work is expected to end in March and will be done as sensitively and considerately as possible. 
Substation move

Still time to have your say on housing allocations

There's still time for you to have your say on how Kensington and Chelsea Council allocates its limited supply of social housing by taking part in a consultation into a new Housing Allocations scheme.

The 12-week consultation is seeking your feedback on issues including who can join the Council's housing register, how they should be prioritised and how homes are ultimately allocated.

A fair and effective Housing Allocations scheme is vital in a borough with more than 3,000 households on its housing register and only around 400 homes – the majority studio or one-bedroom properties – available each year.

Help decide how £1.3m could benefit the Grenfell-affected community

Would you like to influence how the remaining £1.3m Curve budget should be spent to benefit the North Kensington community? If so, don't miss The Curve Community Meeting on Tuesday 15 February from 7pm to 8.45pm at The Curve, 10 Bard Road.

This is a chance for the Grenfell-affected community to come together and start the process of co-designing the new Curve Residents' Steering Group. This steering group will have responsibility for establishing an independent Community Trust comprising members of the North Kensington community. The Trust will oversee the remaining Curve budget and ensure it is delivering projects and initiatives that the community want and need.

Last year a 'Community Conversation' took place to discuss the future of The Curve after confirmation that the lease for the current Curve building on Bard Road is due to end in July 2022. The conversation asked how the community wanted The Curve's remaining budget to be spent when the Curve ceases to operate from Bard Road on Thursday 31 March 2022.

A total of 218 residents took part in the consultation which included 167 responses to a survey. The most popular preference was the creation of a Curve Legacy Fund to be set up from the remaining budget, with the Curve Board Governor's Community Trust proposal the second preferred option.

This community meeting will be the first in a series of meetings where you can:

- Hear more about how you can be involved in the future of the Curve Fund and ask any questions you may have
- Start the process of co-designing the Curve Residents' Steering Group
- Start the discussion around who and how local residents should be appointed to the Steering Group
- Hear from the Curve's Board of Governors and the Council's Head of Community Participation

North Ken exhibition to shed light on Windrush generation

An artifact exhibition called Windrush Generation: London is the Place for Me is coming to North Kensington Library on Windrush Day, from Wednesday 22 June until Friday 28 October, and to the Harrow Road Library in Queens Park, celebrating the lives of the borough's Windrush heroes.

The Windrush Generation are the Caribbean men and women who aided the reconstruction of Britain post WWII and beyond. This exhibition will give insight to the lives and experiences of these everyday heroes. It will also offer the opportunity to hear individual accounts of their contributions to the borough and to British culture.

We want to hear about the triumphs and struggles the Windrush Generation overcame as they navigated their way through post-war London. The Windrush Taskforce invites those who lived through this period to contribute to the exhibition by sharing their experiences and artefacts, such as passports, photographs, letters, travel tickets, newspaper clippings, books, suitcases, clothing, Dutch pots, records, and any other notable items from the Windrush Generation, along with their accompanying stories.

February's Grenfell Community Assembly to be held in-person

The next Grenfell Community Assembly is being held this month on Tuesday 22 February from 5.30pm until 8pm.

Due to public health concerns, we planned to host the event online via Zoom. However, given the change in government guidance and our understanding that residents prefer to attend the Assemblies in-person, we have decided to proceed with February's event face-to-face at Al Manaar Muslim Cultural Heritage Centre, Acklam Road, W10 5YG.

The Assembly will focus on community safety, a topic that was selected by North Kensington residents, and offer attendees refreshments and access to information stands from 5.30pm.

From 6pm, a number of roundtable discussions will be held covering the following themes:

- Serious youth violence
- Violence against women and girls
- Modern slavery
- Antisocial behaviour
- ✓ Hate crime
- General community safety

These discussions will give residents the opportunity to share their thoughts with members of the Grenfell community, representatives from the Council and officers from the Met Police.

Following the event, we will create a document detailing how the Council and its partner agencies plan to respond to any issues raised throughout the Assembly.

Heat network to deliver clean energy in North Ken

A renewable heat network will deliver affordable and cleaner energy for residents in North Kensington. Kensington and Chelsea Council has received funding from the Government to design and deliver a renewable heat network to help reach its goal to be a carbon neutral council by 2030.

The Council has been awarded over £1.1 million through the Government's heat networks investment project (HNIP). Large air source heat pumps and an electric boiler will be able to provide renewable heating and hot water to 826 existing homes in North Kensington and several buildings and businesses. The scheme is expected to save 1,400 tonnes of carbon per year over the first 15 years of operation.

Around 80 per cent of the homes that will connect to the network are currently heated by two heat networks which are over 40 years old, and the remainder use individual combi boilers. By using air source heat pump technology the Notting Dale heat network will be zero carbon from 2030, supporting the Council's plans for the borough to become net zero carbon by 2040.

It is hoped that the Notting Dale heat network will act as a blueprint for the rest of the borough, with funding already secured for a £150,000 research project which will find additional renewable energy sources available to the Council to generate clean, flexible and locally generated energy for social rented homes.

The ultimate aim is to expand this renewable energy network across the entire borough helping decarbonise its housing stock of just over 9,000 homes as well as public buildings such as schools and leisure centres.

Covid update

Changes to what to do after a positive Rapid Lateral Flow Test (LFT)

If you get a positive LFT result and you don't have Covid-19 symptoms you do not need to take a follow-up PCR test. You must self-isolate immediately and report your result on **www.gov.uk/report-covid19-result**. If you want to apply for the £500 Test and Trace Support Payment, you will need to get a confirmatory PCR test. Go to **www.rbkc.gov.uk** and search financial support during covid.

Changes to isolation period following a positive test

The isolation period following a positive test result has changed. You can now leave self-isolation after five full days, **if you do a rapid lateral flow test (LFT) on days five and six of your self-isolation period and:**

- both tests are negative
 - you did the tests at least 24 hours apart

you do not have a high temperature

If you leave self-isolation on or after day six, you are strongly advised to:

- wear a face covering and limit your close contact with other people in crowded or poorly ventilated spaces
- work from home if you can

minimise your contact with anyone who is at higher risk from Covid-19

Where to get vaccinated

The best way to protect yourself from serious illness or hospitalisation from Covid-19 is to be vaccinated. Although the booster jab gives you the most protection, if you are unvaccinated the first and second jabs will give you significantly more protection than being unvaccinated.

You can book your first, second or booster dose at **www.nhs.uk** or by calling NHS 119.

The Science Museum in South Kensington is open as a vaccination centre for walk-ins and pre-booked appointments. It is open seven days a week from 8.30am to 7.15pm.

You can also go to St Charles Health and Wellbeing Centre and a number of local pharmacies in the borough, or the vaccine bus which is at locations around the borough. Go to **www.rbkc.gov.uk** and search Coronavirus FAQ for more details.

Testing

If you have Coronavirus symptoms you can book a PCR test at the forecourt at Kensington Town Hall, Hornton Street, W8 7NX between 9am and 4pm, seven days a week, go to **www.nhs.uk** or call **NHS 119**. You must book a test and bring your phone when getting the test.

Only get a PCR test if you have Coronavirus symptoms or have been asked to get tested. If you have symptoms, self-isolate immediately. Don't wait for a test or a test result before doing so. If you have no symptoms you should get tested at least twice a week and before periods of higher risk using a Rapid Lateral Flow Test (LFT) in order to prevent asymptomatic people spreading the virus without realising.

- Closed Saturday and Sunday

Please do not attend this site if you have Coronavirus symptoms. You can also go to **www.gov.uk** and click on Coronavirus to order home testing kits.

New travel testing requirements

If you are under 18 or qualify as fully vaccinated, you no longer need to:

- take a pre-departure test before you travel to England
- self-isolate when you arrive in England (you should still book and pay for post-arrival tests)
- you can take a lateral flow test instead of a PCR test on or before day 2 after you arrive in England (you must book the test before you travel). If the test is positive, you must self-isolate and take a free NHS PCR test to confirm the result.
