

We ran a survey to hear directly from you how Coronavirus has affected your lives.


We know this is an extremely challenging time for you and that the Coronavirus pandemic has affected many aspects of your day-to-day life.

Businesses safely welcome back residents

Pubs, restaurants and cafes in the borough have been able to serve customers al fresco this summer thanks to new licenses for outdoor dining space.

Businesses can apply for fast-tracked Pavement Licenses, which can be granted within 10 working days rather than the standard 28 and allow for tables and chairs to be placed outside premises. The new Seasonal Highways Licence is also available for businesses to request to put outdoor furniture in suspended parking bays.

It's a top priority to get our businesses trading safely again and having more, spacious outside dining means you can enjoy a meal while being totally social distanced. Since opening, 28 Pavement Licence applications and 27 Seasonal Highways applications have been received.

News from the Grenfell Tower Memorial Commission

The Grenfell Tower Memorial Commission has recently published its second blog by co-chair, Thelma Stober.

In Thelma's blog, she reflects on her experience of the 7/7 London attacks, and subsequently of the 7/7 memorial, as a place of peace and unity. Thelma discusses her motivation to make a difference to those affected by the Grenfell Tower tragedy, by achieving a fitting memorial that brings similar comfort to be eaved families, survivors and the wider community. She also speaks about the important task ahead, of listening and working through the different views and ideas about the future Grenfell Tower memorial.

From September onwards, a newly-appointed community engagement specialist, Kaizen, will work closely with the Commission to reach out and listen to the community via a series of opportunities, both online and face-to-face, if and where possible.

Striking sculpture to be repaired

A local sculpture damaged during the response to the Grenfell Tower tragedy was due to be removed from the site for repair as this issue of North Ken News went to press.

The five-metre high bright pink painted steel sculpture named Gravity/Levity was designed by artist Nigel Hall RA as part of the Kensington Aldridge Academy and Kensington Leisure Centre developments in 2014. It will be familiar to many locally and proved particularly popular with the school's students.

The sculpture sat on a concrete plinth within the fenced-off area around the Tower. Given the size and weight of the sculpture – it weighs one-and-a-half tonnes – a crane was required to lift the piece onto a trailer before it was transported away for repair.

The plinth will remain in place and the soil surrounding the sculpture will not be disturbed during this process, with the company conducting the removal adhering to all social distancing and safety requirements.

Once the piece has been repaired, it will be stored at a secure location and the Council will work with the local community on options for re-siting it. For more information, please contact the Culture Service at culture@rbkc.gov.uk

go, he said: "The Community Leadership Programme has something for everyone. The courses help you to grow and give you priceless information about whatever stage of life or career you are at."

Homes for local heroes

A Key Worker Accommodation Pilot Scheme is providing 14 affordable modern apartments for NHS and education staff in Kensington and Chelsea.


The striking homes in Kensal Road, North Kensington, have been made available to local heroes working in the NHS or primary and secondary schools who provide a service to the borough's residents.

The scheme, which closed for new applications in mid-August, will allow the Council to assess the level of demand for such properties and develop a longer-term policy for key worker accommodation across Kensington and Chelsea.

The 14 properties comprise six one-bedroom, six two-bedroom and two three-bedroom apartments and feature fitted kitchens with integrated appliances and flooring throughout. They are also close to several public transport options, including Bakerloo Line stations.

This will leave vulnerable children and young people increasingly hidden from support services and unable to escape harm or abuse at home. Help catch recycling's most wanted

We know residents in our borough care about the environment.

In Kensington and Chelsea, we have a higher recycling rate than other boroughs with similar housing populations: last year residents recycled 28.6 per cent of their waste. Still, we know we can do more to improve recycling rates and make our borough a nicer place for everyone.

That's why the Council has teamed up with Innocent drinks, makers of tasty smoothies and juices whose HQ is based in North Kensington, along with environmental charity Hubbub to launch a new campaign in time for this year's National Recycling Week (21-27 September 2020).

The campaign asks residents to help catch "recycling's most wanted" - items that belong in the recycling but sometimes don't make it - and will be featured on posters, recycling bags and leaflets, digital display and recycling trucks across the borough as well as some fun games and handy tips on social media. The joint campaign will support households with recycling, starting at home in Kensington and Chelsea.

The campaign is part of the Council's ambition for a cleaner, greener local environment with less waste, better air quality and a target to be a carbon neutral borough by 2040.


Get Involved in Culture in Kensington and Chelsea

Green light for new Council homes

Plans for the first phase of Kensington and Chelsea's ambitious New Homes Programme to build over 600 new homes on Council owned land, including at least 300 at social rent, have been approved by planners.

The applications approved are for 97 new homes across four developments in the north of the borough, located on Kensal Road, Acklam Road, Hewer Street and St Helens Gardens.

The homes will be offered at various tenures, including 49 at social rent, 22 at intermediate rent – which could be used by key workers – and 26 at market rent levels.

The homes form stage one of the Council's new homes programme, with public consultation on potential stage two sites due to begin this autumn. Planning applications for the stage two sites are expected to be submitted in Spring 2021.





The developments passed in the Stage One planning application are:

- **Kensal Road** 37 new homes (27 social rent, 10 intermediate rent)
- Acklam Road 32 new homes (20 social rent, 12 open market)
- Hewer Street 20 new homes
 (10 intermediate rent, 10 open market)
- St Helens Gardens 8 new homes
 (2 social rent, 2 intermediate rent, 4 open market)

In addition to the new homes, the developments at Kensal Road and Acklam Road include community, employment and retail space.

The Acklam Road development includes a community room for residents in the neighbouring Swinbrook Estate and a separate space for Al Manaar Muslim Cultural Heritage Centre, while the Kensal Road site will provide community and retail space.

Works are due to begin by the end of 2020, with the first homes expected to be ready for residents during 2022.
