Introduction and methodology

Introduction

City Living, Local Life (CLLL) is an initiative where Ward Councillors and the community in their Ward work together to identify local issues that matter and find practical ways to make the area a better place to live. As part of the Holland Ward CLLL initiative Ward Councillors commissioned a survey of residents in order to canvass views on local priorities and community projects. The survey was also used to collect the contact details of Holland Ward's residents who wished to be further involved in the initiative. The survey was conducted in July and August 2015.

Methodology

A survey was developed in collaboration with the Ward Members for Holland Ward. A paper copy of the questionnaire was sent to all households in Holland Ward, using the Council Tax Register. In total, the questionnaire was posted to 5,242 households. An electronic version was also available for those that wished to complete the survey this way. A total of 603 responses were received, which equates to a response rate of 11.5 per cent.

Survey Results: At a glance

Issues identified as need most improvement:

The level of traffic congestion (52 per cent)
The level of pollution (31 per cent)
Parking for residents or visitors (28 per cent)

Employment projects

Training and apprenticeships received the highest level of support for proposed employment projects (39 per cent).

•**Parking**: Half of respondents think parking control in the area should be left unchanged (51 per cent). •**Opera Holland Park:** 40 per cent have never visited. Around a quarter visit once a year (26 per cent) and at least twice a year or more (24 per cent).

•Affordable Housing: around two-third respondents (65 per cent) worry about the affordability of housing in the Royal Borough, especially for those on low to middle incomes to an extent .

•Basement developments: over half of respondents (58 per cent) support the new controls on megabasements recently introduced by the Council.

Community Living

- •Asked about volunteering in the borough, around two-thirds of respondents (65 per cent) did not respond. Volunteering in museums (11 per cent) and arts and special events (10 per cent) received the highest responses.
- •The majority of respondents (74 per cent) personally feel part of the community in their local area, to an extent.
- •Half indicated they are not interested in community kitchen gardens (56 per cent).
- •Project ideas tended to focus on children and young people, gardening and establishing meeting groups.
- •Traffic /road safety, followed by planning and refuse/street cleanliness were identified as the areas, which would improve local life in Holland Ward.

211 respondents provided contact details so they could get involved in City Living, Local Life.

Survey Results: Local issues for improvement

Traffic/road safety

Not happy that traffic lights have been put up at the end of my road i.e. junction of Abbotsbury Road and Holland Park Avenue. There is now a build up of queuing traffic outside my home.

Should have a zebra crossing by Abbotsbury Road entrance to Holland Park

Street cleanliness

Roundabout in Shepherds Bush is very dirty with litter, no trees and no benches.

Key issues: rubbish and pollution. Rubbish and litter on the streets is a shame. People should be fined.

Local amenities/leisure facilities

The disappointing choice of shops in Kensington High Street- hearing shops, funeral directors and masses of sports shops, look how Westbourne area has progressed. The Town Hall was used for antiques fairs and we need to have the Odeon.

There should be more gyms in the area with affordable prices.

Planning

Being consistent with planning applications and permission. Some residents get away with carrying out major building with no permission and the Council does nothing.


Planning has become too restrictive and biased, only the options of objectors are listened to, homeowners who wish to improve their homes are the real 'villains' without rights.



Survey Results: Parking

When asked if they favoured the introduction of pay by phone parking across the borough over a third (39 per cent) of respondents indicated they are for it and around a quarter are against it (28 per cent)

The majority of respondents thought that parking control in the area should be left unchanged (51 per cent).






Survey Results: Opera Holland Park

Respondents were asked how often they visit Opera Holland Park and 40 per cent have never done so. Of those who have visited Opera Holland Park, it tends to be once a year (26 per cent) and under a quarter go more frequently, at least twice a year or more (24 per cent).


Thirty-nine per cent of respondents, to some extent, support the idea of new, removable oak-framed buildings for Opera Holland Park to replace the current white marquees. However, 31 per cent stated not at all.





Survey Results: Affordable Housing


Two-thirds of respondents indicated they worry about the affordability of housing in the Royal Borough, especially for those on low to middle incomes to an extent, (33 per cent to some extent and 32 per cent to a great extent).





Survey Results: Basement developments


The majority of respondents (58 per cent) support the new controls on mega-basements recently introduced by the Council to a great extent and 12 per cent were not aware of the policy.



Survey Results: Community Kitchens Gardens

There are a number of Community Kitchen Gardens (allotment style gardens where local residents can grow their own fruit and vegetables) in the Royal Borough including in Holland Ward on Russell Road.

Respondents were asked if they would be interested in Community Kitchen Gardening, most stated they are not interested (56 per cent) and around a fifth indicated interest (22 per cent).



Environmental activities


Through the community kitchen garden, but not through anything else

Survey Results: Improving local life in Holland Ward

Traffic/road safety

Speed bumps on Oakwood Court Road. Cars pick up speed after they have turned off Abbotsbury/Addison Road and they endanger the pedestrians who cross from side to side in this very built-up residential area.

The new traffic control at the junction of Holland Park and Holland Park Avenue is causing chaos, appears to be more dangerous.

Positive comments

I think the Council does a very good job in supporting many aspects of community living.

I think Holland Ward is well run and the Council does a good job.

I am part of the community gardeners at Kensington Olympia station. It is fantastic and is such a great idea

Planning

Stop being so restrictive about planning permission. We have had several basements done in our street and I am 100 per cent supportive. It does not affect us at all. Why do you take exception to it?

More public/social service (green, school, transport connection of Olympia to Earl's Court and Shepherds Bush via tube) paid by the mega project at the end of Kensington High Street [St Edwards development].

Refuse/Street cleanliness

Fly tipping is an issue in my neighbourhood. Could the Council remind to residents that this is illegal or control this in some way?


The depot at the corner of Pembroke and Warwick Roads, which seems to house the Borough's garbage trucks, needs to be moved to of this residential area. It is filthy and smells.



Survey Results: Profile of respondents

Half of the respondents who responded were female (50 per cent) and 11 per cent did not state their gender.

The largest age groups who responded to the survey were aged 60 and above (43 per cent), followed by those aged 40 - 59.





Survey Results: Profile of respondents

Nearly three-quarters of respondents (74 per cent) indicated they were from a white background.

Over half of respondents (50 per cent) have lived in the borough for 20 years or more.
