		RBKC's Corporate Property Department has an interest in the potential designation of the Conservation Area as they own the freehold of Avondale Park Primary School on Sirdar Road, W11. As can be seen from the proposed Avondale Conservation Area boundary reproduced below, the site of Avondale Park Primary School is proposed to be dissected by the Conservation Area boundary with the original Victorian school building to the north included, and the more modern school building to the south excluded.	
		Whilst RBKC's Corporate Property Department does not have an in principle objection to the designation of a Conservation Area for Avondale, recognising the architectural and historical value of the Victorian terraces constructed during the period 1870 to 1895, there are nevertheless some concerns regarding the implications of part of Avondale Park Primary School being included in the Conservation Area.	or e
		As you are aware, there is significant pressure on school places across the Borough, especially at primary school level where only 64.9% of children starting primary school in September 2012 received their preferred option, while 35.1% of youngsters missed out.	
		RBKC's Corporate Property Department is continuing to work wit schools across all levels within the Royal Borough to ensure that their accommodation is of the highest contemporary standard and is able to contribute to the outstanding educational offer of the Royal Borough's schools. In many cases, this involves making significant changes to existing school buildings which, although visually grand and appealing, do often not provide the flexibility, specification, quality and quantum of floorspace that is demanded by the service.	d
		Whilst RBKC's Corporate Property Department are not currently considering improvements to the quantum or quality of the accommodation provided at Avondale Park Primary School, it is evident that the existing Victorian school building may not provide	)

the highest quality educational space in terms of flexibility of use, accessibility, environmental performance, classroom layout and various other criteria which are characteristic of Victorian building design.

RBKC's Corporate Property Department considers it imperative that should a Avondale Conservation Area be designated, that the accompanying Conservation Area Appraisal does not require the retention of the Victorian school building as a default but rather recognises that whilst it may be considered to positively contribute to the character and appearance of the Conservation Area, it does not provide floorspace which is of a specification or quality that lends itself to achieving the educational standards sought by the Royal Borough or contributing to providing additional school places to address rising demand.

To this end, the Local Planning Authority may consider including wording in any future Conservation Area Appraisal which makes it clear that the Council may exceptionally grant Conservation Area Consent for the demolition of the Victorian school building if part of a wider redevelopment scheme that can demonstrate the deficiencies of the existing space to provide on-going educational floorspace of the highest quality. If this case can be made, alongside demonstrating that redevelopment optimises the use of the school site, the Conservation Area designation could then be used to ensure the delivery of a replacement school building of the highest quality which contributes to the enhancement of the Avondale Conservation Area.

Whilst we appreciate that the principal reason for designating a Conservation Area is to enhance and preserve the special architectural or historical character of a particular area, we consider that it is equally as important to recognise that as in the case of Avondale Park Primary School, there may be buildings in public service use which do not provide the quality or specification of accommodation required to meet the highest standards of service delivery. These representations are intended to ensure that in such cases, the Conservation Area Appraisal will apply sufficient flexibility to allow the assessment of proposals for the loss of a building located in a Conservation Area in a holistic matter including against quality of replacement accommodation, overall benefits to educational offer, efficiency of use of land and quality and appropriateness of replacement buildings.

I trust these representations are of interest when you are considering the allocation of an Avondale Conservation Area and drafting of a subsequent Conservation Area Appraisal.
