### **Information**



#### **Audience**

These courses are intended for all children's workforce practitioners, i.e. all staff who work with children, young people and their families.

Although these courses form part of an induction programme for new starters, it is also intended for all practitioners who want to improve their knowledge and continue their professional development.



#### **Accreditation**

All courses have been independently certified as conforming to universally accepted Continuous Professional Development (CPD) guidelines



#### Certification

At the end of the courses is a quiz which contains questions based on the course content.

The pass mark is set at 80%.

#### **CWDC Induction Standards**

The CWDC induction standards set out what new workers should know, understand and be able to do within six months of starting work.

They are now mandatory for the children's social care workforce and can be used successfully for other roles too. All courses are in this programme are linked to the induction standards set by the CWDC.



#### **Duration**

Course timings vary and range from 25-85 minutes. Please ensure you set aside enough time to complete the courses by agreeing times with your manager.

Managers, please encourage staff to complete courses with uninterrupted access.

## **Abuse of Children with Disabilities**

Many of us find it hard to understand how anyone could abuse any child, let alone a child with disabilities.

Yet this refusal to accept the abuse of disabled children often means that practitioners disregard the signs of abuse, therefore allowing the abuse to continue.

•Be aware of possible signs and indicators of abuse of children with disabilities.

#### **Objectives**

#### This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of disability.
- Know why disabled children are more vulnerable to abuse.
- Understand the challenges faced where abuse of a disabled child is suspected.

This course takes approximately 25 to 35 minutes to complete.

All those who come into contact with children and families in their everyday work, including practitioners who do not have a specific role in relation to safeguarding children, have a duty to safeguard and promote the welfare of children.

All practitioners have a role to play in supporting children to achieve the five Every Child Matters outcomes – which includes 'stay safe'.

# **Bullying**

Children and young people who are being bullied need positive strategies to empower them to cope, to develop constructive ways of frustrating the efforts of the young person who bullies them, or even to help them change the bully's behaviour.

#### Upon successful completion of this training course, you will:

Be aware of possible signs and indicators of bullying.

#### **Objectives:**

This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of bullying and cyber bullying.
- Understand the different types of bullying.
- Learn the signs of bullying.
- Learn about the technologies used by cyber bullies.
- Know what to do if you suspect a child is being bullied or cyber bullied.

#### **Duration:**

This course takes approximately 50 to 70 minutes to complete.

## **Child Abuse Introduction**

There are different forms of abuse and practitioners need to be able to recognise the possible signs and indicators that a child or young person is suffering or is at risk of abuse and understand the effects that abuse can have on children and young people.

Child abuse occurs when a person in a position of trust and/or authority misuses this power over a child and causes him or her emotional and/or physical harm. This person could be a family member, a babysitter, a stranger or a community caregiver.

• Be aware of different forms of abuse.

#### **Objectives:**

This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of Child Protection and Child Abuse.
- Understand the concept of Significant Harm.
- Learn the key principles of Child Protection.
- Know what to do if Child Abuse is suspected.

# **Child in Need and Child Protection**

Social Services operations can be seen as a strand of processes beginning with a child's first contact with social care and ending in case closure through assessment, planning, intervention and review.

#### **Objectives:**

#### This course will enable you to:

- The Child in Need and Child Protection processes.
- The Child in Need and Child Protection Timescales.

### **Domestic Abuse**

To stop domestic abuse, the perpetrator needs to stop abusing. For this reason, any person who may come into contact with people who abuse in a domestic setting need to understand why it happens and how to help prevent it from happening.

#### Upon successful completion of this training course, you will:

 Be aware of the laws and national guidance relating to protecting and safeguarding children and young people.

#### **Objectives:**

#### The 'problem' course will enable you to:

- The nature of domestic abuse
- Who is affected
- How the law can help
- And, what the police can do.

#### The 'perpetrator' course will:

Help you understand the issues relating to the abuser or perpetrator of domestic abuse

#### The 'victim' course will enable you to understand:

- The range of situations victims might experience
- The effect the abuse can have
- · How victims think about their abuse and the abuser
- The effect it can have on the children living in abusive households
- Why victims sometimes don't leave
- What victims need to feel they can leave abusive relationships
- How you should deal with victims of domestic abuse

#### **Duration:**

This course takes approximately 65 to 85 minutes to complete.

# **Emotional Abuse**

Sustained abuse is likely to have a deep impact on the child's self-image and self-esteem and on their future life as an adult.

The effects of ongoing child abuse are dynamic and interact with each other and can have major long-term effects on all aspects of a child's health, development and well-being.

• Be aware of possible signs and indicators of emotional abuse

#### **Objectives**

This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of Emotional Abuse
- Know who emotionally abuses children
- Know the signs and symptoms of Emotional Abuse
- Learn the points to consider where Emotional Abuse is suspected

#### **Duration:**

This course takes approximately 35 to 45 minutes to complete.

All practitioners need to be aware of and work to overcome any barriers to inclusion.

# **Information Sharing**

Information sharing is key to delivering better, more efficient services that are coordinated around the needs of children, young people and families.

It is essential to enable early intervention and preventative work, for safeguarding and promoting welfare and for wider public protection. Information sharing is a vital element in improving outcomes for all.

#### Upon successful completion of this training course, you will:

· Understand how information sharing applies to your work

#### **Objectives**

This course will enable you to:

- Understand why information sharing and obtaining consent is important
- Know the seven golden rules for information sharing
- Know who can give consent and when to share information without consent
- Know the questions they should ask themselves when they are asked to or wish to share information
- Know how to share information using a variety of communication methods e.g. by post and email

#### **Duration:**

This course takes approximately 35 to 45 minutes to complete.

# Neglect

There are some general indicators that a child or young person may be suffering from some kind of harm. Non-specific signs such as a sudden withdrawal from others, or extreme anger or sadness may indicate something is wrong.

These indicators do not conclusively mean that a child or young person is being abused; however they are reason for some concern.

#### Upon successful completion of this training course, you will:

• Be aware of possible signs and indicators of neglect

#### **Objectives**

This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of Neglect
- Know who neglects children
- Know the signs and symptoms of Neglect
- Learn the points to consider where Neglect is suspected

This course takes approximately 35 to 45 minutes to complete.

# **Physical Abuse**

Physical abuse can cause physical injury, brain damage or disability and may lead to children developing emotional, behavioural or educational problems.

Physical abuse has been linked to aggressive behaviour in children and educational difficulties.

#### **Objectives**

This course will enable you to:

- Learn the definition of physical abuse
- Know who physically abuses children
- Know the signs and symptoms of physical abuse
- Learn the points to consider where physical abuse is suspected

This course takes approximately 35 to 45 minutes to complete.

## **Sexual Abuse**

It is important that all practitioners are aware of and recognise the different forms of abuse.

It is also important to note that types of abuse are more often found in combination than alone.

For example, a physically abused child is often emotionally abused as well, and a sexually abused child may also be neglected.

• Be aware of possible signs and indicators of sexual abuse

#### **Objectives**

This course will enable you to:

- Know who sexually abuses children
- Understand how Sexual Abuse can start
- Know the signs and symptoms of Sexual Abuse
- Recognise the points to consider where Sexual Abuse is suspected

#### **Duration:**

This course takes approximately 40 to 60 minutes to complete.
