IMPORTANT UPDATES

Safer Recruitment Training

Keeping Children Safe In Education explains that from September 2014 a change will be made to the training requirement for recruitment panels.

Currently at least one panel member is required to have completed Secretary of State approved training, an online version of which can be accessed at: <u>https://www.education.gov.uk/e-learning/login/index.php</u>.

From September 2014, although regulations will continue to require one member of any recruitment panel to have undertaken safer recruitment training, it will be for settings to judge what training will be appropriate for their staff and the circumstances of the setting.

Access to the Secretary of State's online training (see link above) will be removed to coincide with that change and the DfE plan to notify registered users of the process for closure during the summer term.

As a result of these changes, the LSCB will revise the training content for our face to face training in order to bring it up to date with recent case reviews.

Female Genital Mutilation

The Home Office has launched a new <u>Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) poster</u> <u>campaign</u> encouraging mothers and carers to contact the NSPCC's dedicated <u>FGM helpline</u> where it is suspected girls are at risk. This summer campaign is being launched in time to raise awareness before the 'cutting season' of the schools' summer break.

Locally, practitioners should refer to Children's Social Services where they suspect a girl is at risk or has undergone FGM. If the risk is imminent, they should call 999 in the first instance. There are three named social workers who can offer advice on FGM and other harmful cultural practices: <u>WCC</u>, <u>RBKC</u>, <u>LBHF</u>. A Tri-borough FGM Strategy is currently being drafted.

Female genital mutilation: the case for a national action plan (published 03 July 2014)

This report, published by the Home Affairs Committee, outlines its recommendations on how to tackle and respond to FGM in the UK in order to safeguard women and girls at risk.

Children and Young People with harmful sexual behaviours

The Executive Summary of this Research In Practice piece gives insight to the headline messages from the comprehensive review of UK and international research and highlights the significant overlap between this issue and child sexual exploitation, domestic violence, neglect and mental health. It also provides a useful introduction to differences in terminology.

Gangs and Serious Youth Violence

The Mayor of London published a report on gangs and serious youth violence in June 2014 which outlines the strategic ambitions to reduce the harm caused by gangs in London. The approach focuses on:

Prevention: Ensuring that our children and young people avoid gang involvement by providing prevention programmes accessible through state schools and other educational establishments

Intervention: A consistent approach to commissioning and delivering sustainable services in custody and the community to reduce serious youth violence and the harm caused by gangs

Enforcement: A targeted criminal justice system approach which delivers swift and sure justice to deter and incapacitate the most harmful gang members

This document sets out what London partners working collaboratively, are seeking to achieve by 2017, to combat gang violence and reduce the harm caused by gangs to individuals and communities in London.

The findings provide some practical and low-cost solutions to helping families in need. The research also provides recommendations for local and central government to consider, and which LSCBs could influence

The NSPCC and Mencap have launched a new version of the successful Underwear Rule campaign. They have produced a guide to help parents teach children who have a learning disability about sexual abuse. Jon Brown, Head of the NSPCC's Strategy and Development for Sexual Abuse programme said:

"It's vital we ensure all children - especially those who may be more vulnerable to sexual abuse learn how to recognise right from wrong behaviour. This is why we are launching an <u>Underwear Rule</u> guide for parents and children with a learning disability. We need to make sure all children know the areas of their bodies that are private, that their body belongs to them and where they can seek help if they need to."

Workshops for named and designated child protection and safeguarding nurses

These workshops from the Tavistock and Portman are intended to develop the skills and understanding of named and designated professionals working in the complex and demanding field of child protection. The sessions offer a reflective space for professionals to take time to think and share clinical dilemmas with colleagues. This process can often be seen as a luxury but many reports and Serious Case Reviews (SCRs) demonstrate that this kind of reflection is an absolute precondition of effective work in the challenging world of child protection.
