# NOUR FESTIVAL 2013 announces its most ambitious programme ever

### Contemporary art, design, film, music and literature from the Middle East and North Africa

- Nour Festival of Arts runs from 1 October 30 November 2013 at more than 20 venues across Kensington and Chelsea.
- Major highlights include the Ferozkoh exhibition in partnership with Doha's Museum of Islamic Art at Leighton House Museum as part of Qatar UK 2013 Year of Culture; Natacha Atlas at the Royal Albert Hall; animation by calligraphic artist Soraya Syed with soundtrack by Nitin Sawhney and interpretive dance performance by Salah El Brogy at Leighton House Museum; the exploration of science fiction narratives between East and West at the Science Museum's Dana Centre; The Perfumed Garden of Sexual Delights, exploring taboos and changing sexual mores across the Middle East at the Mosaic Rooms; Hall of Heaven, five contemporary female Iranian artists at Kensington and Chelsea College; and a chance to cook with Ottolenghi Ltd's Head Chef Sami Tamimi.
- Venues include: The V&A, Science Museum, Ismaili Centre, The Mosaic Rooms and the Tabernacle, while new partners in 2013 include the Museum of Islamic Art, Doha, Chelsea Theatre, and the Royal Albert Hall.

Nour Festival of Arts is rapidly becoming one of Europe's most significant annual showcases of contemporary arts and culture from across the Middle East and North Africa (MENA), taking place every October and November at venues across the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea.

A highlight in 2013 is the partnership with the *Museum of Islamic Art [MIA], Doha* which brings to London the remarkable exhibition *Ferozkoh: Tradition and Continuity* 

in Afghan Art. Ferozkoh pairs together priceless historical objects from MIA's collection with modern-day interpretations by craftspeople from Afghanistan, created in response to, and in conversation with, the historical objects. Ferozkoh – which is also part of Qatar UK 2013 Year of Culture – is MIA's first ever touring exhibition and will be on display at Leighton House Museum, the very embodiment of the meeting between East and West.

Nour, which means light or illumination in many Middle Eastern languages, challenges preconceptions, sparks debate and provides insight into culture from across the MENA region. The Festival welcomes established artists and emerging talent to some of the foremost cultural institutions in the UK, creating a diverse programme that encompasses current affairs, cuisine, contemporary visual arts, film, music, poetry and performance

Arabic is the second spoken language of Kensington and Chelsea, where the Council launched the Nour Festival at its Leighton House Museum in 2010. In just three years the Festival has grown to encompass more than twenty venues across the borough, while the programme reflects the dramatic changes taking place across the MENA region. Nour is a byword for debate, cultural exchange and international artistic excellence.

#### 2013 Festival

The 2013 Festival sees the continued expansion of the Nour programme and the range of organisations involved, while continuing to offer the unexpected and thought-provoking. Foremost a celebration of artistic and cultural excellence, Nour does not shy away from the social and political challenges in the region: for example, photographer **Sandro Vannini** on the distinct challenges in protecting Egypt's antiquities, and a panel discussion chaired by author **David McDowell** on issues facing Kurds and the question of Kurdish nationalism.

Cllr. Timothy Coleridge, Cabinet Member for Planning Policy, Transport and Arts, said:

"We created the Nour Festival in 2010 in the belief that everyone in the Royal Borough should have the opportunity to experience world-class arts and culture. The significant growth of the festival highlights a wider audience across London and beyond, interested in exploring an often unseen side of the Middle East and North Africa – its contemporary culture and artistic expression.

"Nour inevitably challenges preconceptions and confounds expectations. This year's festival is no different. Audiences can join us on a journey through the region, enjoy a variety of artistic forms, encounter unexpected voices, and engage with issues as diverse as identity, personal health or individual rights.

"Looking ahead to 2014 and beyond, we believe the Nour Festival will continue to thrive and prosper, with the introduction of even more partners – local, national and international alike. Global interest in Nour continues to grow, as does the appreciation of its large and varied audiences."

  Leighton House Museum in partnership with Doha's Museum of Islamic Art
  [MIA] as part of Qatar UK 2013 Year of Culture. The show pairs together
  priceless historical objects from MIA's collection with modern day
  interpretations by craftspeople from Afghanistan. (14 Nov 24 Feb)
- Internationally-renowned artist Natacha Atlas in concert at the Royal Albert Hall to showcase her globally recognised meld of Eastern and Western Musics (12 Oct)

- A new animation commission from calligraphic artist Soraya Syed with an original soundtrack by Nitin Sawhney (5-31 Oct) and interpretive dance by Salah El Brogy (formerly of Akram Khan Dance Company) (20 Oct only) both at Leighton House Museum
- London Algerian Ballet performing A Journey to Algeria, a unique dance show uncovering the rich cultural heritage and history of Algeria marrying vintage traditional dances with vibrant contemporary performances. The Tabernacle (8 Nov)
- Panel discussion on the taboos and changing sexual mores in the Arab World
  at the Mosaic Rooms entitled *Does the Arab Spring need a Summer of*Love? Sex is entwined in politics and economics, religion and tradition,
  gender and generations, making it a powerful lens to examine the Arab
  region's complex landscape. (6 Nov)
- A solo exhibition of paintings and drawings by the Syrian Kurdish artist
   Lawand at the Mosaic Rooms exploring exile, displacement and the influence of poetry. (4 October 29 Nov)
- An evening with Sami Tamimi: Dishes from Jerusalem. A unique event showcasing a selection of the finest dishes from Jerusalem with the Head Chef of Ottolenghi restaurant. Books for Cooks (7 Nov).
- A discussion to explore the transition of science fiction narratives between
  East and West, where luminary speakers with a diverse range of perspectives
  will ask whether a revival of Arab Science Fiction is of international
  importance. At Science Museum's Dana Centre (2 Oct)
- Half of Heaven, an exhibition by five contemporary female Iranian artists at Kensington and Chelsea College, which showcase the ways in which artists have found varying strategies to circumvent censorship and critique Iran's theocratic dictatorship. (10 – 24 Oct)
- Borderless beats featuring 47 SOUL, a newly formed Palestinian and Jordanian band laying down Arabic Reggae, Hip Hop, and Mijwez solos overtop of Debka, Rai, and Afrobeat grooves at The Floyover Portobello (19 Oct).
- Crossways / Al Multaq, dialogue and exchange by artists and musicians with roots from different Arab regions at Leighton House Museum (5 Nov)

An iconic feature of the Doha skyline, the Museum of Islamic Art represents the full scope of Islamic art from three continents over 1,400 years. The Museum was designed by noted architect I.M. Pei, who was inspired by elements of classic Islamic architecture. Connected to the Museum is MIA Park where you can participate in activities, rent bicycles and paddleboats, or just gaze at the Doha skyline.
