Council approves budget for 2024/25

Last month, the Council approved the budget for the year ahead, focused on delivering quality services to our residents and communities while balancing the books.



Financial pressures and increased costs to deliver services mean councillors have had to take the decision to increase council tax this year by 4.99 per cent. This means an average Band D property (excluding garden squares) will rise from £988.26 to £1,037.58, an increase of £49.32 from last year.

From helping low-income families with a £100 payment to £10 million in the pipeline for new facilities for residents with social care needs in North Kensington, we are committed to deliver

a budget that is greener, safer and fairer for all.

Get ready for upcoming elections

Are you ready for the upcoming Mayor of London and London Assembly elections on Thursday 2 May 2024?

To have your say, you will need to make sure you are registered to vote and have a valid photo ID, which is now required when voting at a polling station. A range of photo ID is accepted, including passports and driving licences. If you don't have a valid photo ID, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate, which will be accepted.

The deadline to register to vote is **Tuesday 16 April**.

Brand new Councilbuilt social homes nearing completion

Brand-new homes for social rent are nearing completion at Acklam Road in North Kensington and will be welcoming new residents by the end of the summer.

Acklam Road is one of the Council's new homes sites which is on track to deliver 20 new social rent homes, including four fully wheelchair accessible properties, alongside 12 market rent homes and community facilities.

The site is located next to the Swinbrook Estate, and opposite the Al-Manaar Muslim Cultural Heritage Centre, both of whom have been involved in developing proposals. Swinbrook Residents' Association has been working with us to help create a new improved accessible ground floor space which will meet the future needs of residents. The remaining ground floor space is to be taken by Al Manaar to create new facilities for the community including a nursery space and community kitchen which will be used to train local people looking for a career in catering. The community facilities are due to be completed later in the summer.

Richard Dobson, Morgan Sindall Construction's London Area Director, said: "We're really looking forward to seeing the doors of Acklam Road open later this year, as it's going to deliver a long list of benefits for the local area. As well as providing a significant number of high-quality affordable homes, this development will also create valuable community spaces for those living and working in Kensington."

No decision has been made on the future of Grenfell Tower and decisions about its future are incredibly sensitive.

The secretary of state for the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities is responsible for decisions on the future of the tower. He has been clear that he will not make



a decision without having further conversations with the community, and that the voices of the bereaved, survivors and immediate community must be at the heart of any decision. The secretary of state continues to meet the community. Healthy, green and happy schools

Six North Kensington schools are getting a makeover to help keep classrooms warm, reduce energy bills and cut carbon into the atmosphere as part of our plans to become net zero.

Highly energy efficient air source heat pumps are replacing old gas heating systems, displacing all the gas consumption associated with providing heating and hot water.

New radiators and pipework are replacing original Victorian pipes. Large radiators with a bigger surface area will help the spaces to get warm, without having radiators at very high temperatures, making them safer for the children. more efficient and more environmentally friendly.

At the Grade II listed Colville Primary School, where works have just begun, the changes are

expected to save 57.4 tonnes of carbon emissions per year. The school has around 450 pupils and was built in 1879.

Works at Avondale Park Primary, St Francis of Assisi, All Saints Catholic College, Thomas Jones Primary School and Bevington Primary School are all due to complete this spring and we are already looking at which buildings we can improve next.
