Our learners in numbers


Adult Learning Service's learners are from many different backgrounds, circumstances and age groups.

We work with learners aged 19 and over and children who are taking part in family learning courses with their parent or carer.



Our courses

Adult learning in Kensington and Chelsea has a wide range of learning opportunities available for adults (aged 19+) and families. Our community learning providers deliver high quality learning for residents in local venues across the borough.

We have:

- Courses to help you improve your **reading and writing, maths and spoken English**, many of which lead to qualifications.
- Vocational courses leading to formal qualifications** to improve your prospects of finding work or finding better work.
- Courses and activities that help you **develop new skills** that can lead to career change or for your own personal development.
- Family learning courses that support parents of pre-school and school-aged children to understand the school curriculum, and to develop your own skills to support your children's development and learning.
- Opportunities for you to learn a range of skills in: arts and crafts; dance; creative writing; reading and comprehension; budgeting; explore the digital world and gain confidence using new technologies.
- Learn about working in specific sectors such as childcare, creative arts and healthcare, or about working for yourself or setting up in business.

Learning to suit you

We teach at different times, so there are opportunities to be involved whether you are available in the day, or only in the evening, or occasionally weekends. Courses vary in length from one day to ten weeks to a year. Some courses are specifically designed for learners over 50 or for adults with disabilities.

English, ESOL and maths

Improve your English and maths to:

- gain confidence
- study and get qualifications
- prepare for vocational study
- help your children with their school work.

Courses range from basic literacy, maths and ESOL for beginners up to level 2 (equivalent to GCSE).

Literacy and English

Learn to be an independent and confident reader, writer and communicator to develop the standard of skills needed to progress in life and at work.

Functional skills will help improve your job prospects in an ever-changing labour market. We will support you to develop the skills that employers need, to achieve and progress to the next level.


Numeracy and mathematics

You will learn a range of skills including:

- Adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing
- How to use a calculator
- Managing money (balances, checking statements, planning a budget)
- Fractions, decimals and percentages
- Taking measurements (eg. how much carpet to buy)

These everyday functional skills can help improve your job prospects and help you in your everyday life.

ESOL – English for speakers of other languages

We offer part-time courses at different levels for people whose first language is not English. The courses will help you improve your skills in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English.

All courses include grammar, study skills, employability, and important communication skills for life and work in the UK.

- help you learn how to support your child's learning and development

Further information

What is the age limit?

Learners need to be aged 19 years or older on 31 August of the academic year, unless they are attending a family learning session with a parent.

Attendance and punctuality

By signing the student declaration and learning agreement on the enrolment form, you have agreed to attend regularly and arrive punctually to class. In order to fully achieve your course you must attend at least 80 per cent of the possible sessions. If your course is accredited and you don't attend for 80 per cent of the sessions you may not be entered for the exam.

Arriving late is disruptive to the class as a whole, and you will miss important elements of the session including valuable recaps of previous learning, health and safety instructions, and aims and objectives of the session. Please try to be on time.

Can I change course?

If you find that the course isn't right for you after the first class, you may be able to change to another course. Please ask your tutor for more information.

Can I enrol on a course that has already started?

With non-exam courses this may be possible, please contact the organisation who is delivering the course. See from page 18 for contact details.

Evidence for eligibility

In order to enrol on a course we must satisfy the requirements of the Education and Skills Funding Agency, and the Greater London Authority, that you are entitled to participate in one of our courses. You will be asked to provide suitable evidence to support your entitlement. If we have previously seen such evidence (within the academic year) you will not normally be asked to provide it again. Types of evidence may include passports, national identity cards, application registration card (ARC), Home Office confirmation, and in exceptional circumstances a photo driving licence.

What you need:

UK/EU citizen

- Your passport or ID card and proof of benefit eligibility

Non EU citizen

- Your passport showing indefinite leave to remain, and proof of benefit eligibility

Asylum seekers (and those whose applications have been turned down but are unable to return home)

- Letter with your Home Office reference number, proof of benefit or proof of permission to work
- An application registration card (ARC)
- Confirmation from the Home Office of Section 4 support within three months of the issue date.

Refugees

- Either proof of benefit AND travel document, or passport

To be eligible to attend courses funded by the ESFA and GLA you must have been resident in the UK or EEU for three years prior to the start of the course, or if you are an asylum seeker or refugee, you need to have been resident for six months prior to the start of the course.

People on visitor visas or work visas and those who are travelling on their partner's work visa are not eligible to attend.

Safeguarding and Prevent Duty

All providers and the Council have a legal responsibility to ensure that learners are safeguarded from harm, and under the Prevent Duty to make sure that we demonstrate British values in our practice.

British values are: democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs. Prevent is part of the Government's counter terrorism strategy.

Safeguarding is about ensuring that you as a learner are safe and within the law.

Staying safe

We all have a responsibility for our own health and safety and those around us that might be affected by what we do; this includes learners, carers, parents, staff and visitors. We ask learners to pay close attention to, and comply with, health and safety advice given to them by their tutor and other staff. Please inform a member of staff if you encounter anything at a venue you are attending that you consider to be a risk to health and safety.

Learners are responsible for ensuring they are medically fit for courses that include physical skills or activities or the use of subject specific equipment and resources. You may be asked to complete a health questionnaire in order to take part in some classes.

All accidents and incidents must be reported – speak to your tutor to find out who at the centre you are learning in should be reported to.

Support for learners with disabilities

We welcome all learners into any of our classes. Where you have a specific known learning difficulty or disability it can help the tutor to plan for your learning needs if they know how best to support you. We can make reasonable adjustments to support your learning – including making personalised learning materials, printing handouts in a larger font, providing an online copy for you to use at home (enabling you to utilise computer speech software). Please let us know what strategies work best for you so that we can include them where possible.

Unique Learner Number (MIAP)

A Unique Learner Number (ULN) is a ten-digit identifier which is applied to the personal learning record of all learners over the age of 14 involved in UK education or training. The number is provided by MIAP (Managing Information Across Partners). We are required by the Greater London Authority to attach a ULN to your learner record.



What we offer

- A safe learning environment. Any issues should be reported to your tutor in the first instance
- Information about your course content
- Support to achieve your learning goals and ongoing feedback about your progress
- A high standard of teaching that is regularly monitored
- Information and advice about learning options available on completion of your course or to support further learning
- Referral, where relevant, to other appropriate local agencies and partner Adult Learning providers
- Referral, where appropriate, to qualified IAG advisers or to a specialist careers advice and guidance service if you need general career advice or more in-depth guidance
- Opportunities to explore volunteering with our partner providers and other organisations locally
- Advice on how to access further support for English, Maths or Language skills
- An opportunity to feedback on how we could improve our services.

What we expect from you

- To show commitment by attending your class every session, on time and advising us if you are unable to attend
- To tell us about your learning support needs and to inform your tutor if there is anything which could affect you attending the course
- To arrive punctually, be prepared to learn and present work on time and to complete any coursework and paperwork as required
- To treat the premises, members of staff, volunteers and other learners with respect

- To use the Internet responsibly and safely when using a computer in class
- To give us feedback to help us improve the service.

How you can help us improve

We aim to meet your needs on every occasion; however, we may not always get it right. We welcome your feedback and you will be given the opportunity to do this by:

- completing a compliments, complaints and suggestions form
- telling a member of staff either in person, by telephone, in writing or by email
- filling in an Evaluation form at the end of your course (ask your tutor for a form)
- completing a learner survey (ask your tutor).

Feedback

We continually look for ways to develop and improve our services and will ask for your feedback throughout your course, at the end of the programme and through surveys. You can make your views heard through feedback forms, learner surveys, progression surveys and in discussion with your tutors. We welcome all feedback.
