activity, or programme	Chelsea's approach to affordable housing, particularly guidance in respect of Local Plan Policy CH2: Affordable Housing and London Plan Policies 3.11 and 3.13.
	The SPD is looking at maximising the opportunities to deliver much needed affordable homes in the borough, which will address the pressing need for them but also create socially inclusive communities. It sets out a number of objectives including providing a definition of what would be considered truly housing in the borough and details the affordable housing tenure mix required based on latest evidence of need and viability.
	The SPD will operate alongside relevant policies of the Local Plan (2019) and the Planning Contributions SPD (2019).

	The RBKC Community Housing SPD provides detailed guidance on how Local Plan policy relating to Affordable Housing will be implemented, in particular Policy CH2 of the Local Plan. The Local Plan 2019 policies were subject to an Integrated Impact Assessment (IIA). The IIA assessed the impact of the Local Plan policies on Equalities. The assessment is set out in Section 9.4 of the submission report. This followed a Health and Equalities Workshop held in June 2016, which raised the concern of a lack of venues for volunteer, charity and public sector organisations to carry out their community work affordably or effectively. The baseline information on which equalities assessment was based is set out in the IIA Scoping Report at Section 7.6.
	Section 9.4 of the IIA explains how equalities groups have been considered and summarises the assessment on equalities of the Local Plan policies. The residual effect of Local Plan Policies, including Policy CH2 is that it will have a positive effect on equalities. The IIA reports that "Policies CP1, CP2, CP3, CH1, CH2, CH3, CH4 and CH6 present an opportunity to improve the proportion of housing which is suitable for all people, including those with disabilities, throughout their lifetimes (IIA Objective 4, first decision-guiding question). More specifically, CP1, CH1 and CH6 provide for an increase in housing / homes which create the opportunity for better-quality homes meeting higher standards relative to equality matters, including energy-efficiency and adaptable for people over their lifetimes. CH1 also seeks to protect existing affordable homes, CH2 requires that the maximum reasonable amount of 'affordable homes' is provided with any proposal (with further provision, e.g. min. 35% affordable home ownership products for major schemes of 650 m2 or over, and the mix of social rented vs. intermediate), and CH3 and CH4 include support for older people's housing (and resistance of loss), meeting a design standard of being adaptable for people over their lifetimes, London Plan requirements for Lifetime Neighbourhoods, and housing that meets a range of specific other needs."
	Therefore, the overarching policy that the SPD is providing guidance on and the SPD itself have been subject to equalities assessment. An overall appraisal of the positive, negative or neutral impact is set out below.

	The Council published a draft of the SPD for a six-week consultation from 11 February to 24 March 2020.
	Engagement took place on a new term for the word "affordable" as it is often misunderstood and has lost its
	meaning. Some 250 individuals participated in polls on this question using the digital platform built-id. The majority
	favoured the term "RBKC Community Housing". This is now reflected in the title of the SPD and throughout the
	document. Many individual comments were also supportive of the approach to affordable housing proposed within
	the SPD. A further fifteen detailed responses via email and on-line responses were received. Most responses from
	residents/residents' associations were supportive, two housing associations also wrote in support and so did the
	Mayor of London. Whilst the developers of Kensal Canalside and Earl's Court Opportunity Area sites in the Borough
	were supportive of the principles, they raised particular concerns regarding the viability of their sites.
	No comments were relates to equalities or the protected characteristics were raised. There were no further findings
	relevant to the EqIA Screening.
