#### New Coronavirus rules from the Government

From Monday 14 September the law changed and it is now illegal for more than six people from different households to meet indoors or outdoors in any social gathering.

Support bubbles or an individual household which has more than six members can still meet, Although these groups cannot come into contact with other groups.

The change does not affect schools, workplaces or Covid-secure weddings or funerals. Organised team sports are also unaffected.

The police will be enforcing this and can issues fines of **£100**. People will be liable to a maximum of **£3,200** for persistent breaches.

Guidance is available from the Government on how to meet with others safely by going to **www.gov.uk** and searching for 'meeting with others'.

## Have you had your free flu vaccine?

#### Flu season is upon us. Every year flu affects thousands, and this is anything but a normal year.

Keep your guard up against flu with the flu vaccine. It's free for:

- people aged 65 and above
- those with a long-term health condition
- anyone who has been shielding and members of their household
- carers
- pregnant women
- children aged two to three
- children in school years up to and including Year 7.

Later in the year, the flu vaccine may be given to 50 to 64-year-olds. If you are aged 50 to 64, please help the NHS vaccinate those most at risk first and wait until you are contacted by your GP.

# The man behind the art of nineties raves

Any rave-goer from the 90s will be familiar with the iconic flyers and posters used to advertise the latest upcoming events or releases.

Ladbroke Grove local, Junior Tomlin, masterminded many of the famous flyers, record sleeves and posters synonymous with this era of music, with his fantastical projections of the future and surreal imagery earning him the title of 'The Salvador Dali of Rave'.

In his heyday, Junior was one of the most soughtafter designers in the music industry with event planners and producers queueing up to commission his art for their latest release. Junior worked with a range of influential rave promoters from 1989 onwards including Telepathy, Dreamscape, Slammin' Vinyl, One Nation, Dream Odyssey and Ravealation.

We spoke to Junior about how North Kensington influenced his art and provided a backdrop to his notoriety in the 90s:

"Growing up in North Kensington and going to school at Byam Shaw School of Art in Notting Hill, I used to visit the North Kensington library and the one on Hornton Street to find reference material to create art the record covers and flyers. I constantly found inspiration in the local area being surrounded by so many creatives.

Junior has released a book of his most renowned and iconic art, 'Junior Tomlin: Flyer & Cover art', recapturing the energy and vibe of that unique era for music.

To me everyone has a spark of creativity and artistry in them, some use it daily, others bury it deep due to a bad creative experience. It is my hope that people who have lost the creative spirit can rekindle it through the pages of my book."

## Leighton House Museum reopens

#### Eager to see some great works of art?

Leighton House, the former home and studio of Victorian artist Frederic, Lord Leighton (1830 – 1896), reopened for pre-booked visits at weekends on Saturday 12 September.

The museum – which houses a collection of paintings by Leighton and his contemporaries – has been closed for six months due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Safety measures are in place to protect staff and visitors including screens in the reception area, a hand sanitiser station at the entrance and strict cleaning routines throughout the day. Visitors are required to wear a face covering and tickets must be pre-booked through Eventbrite.

You might have spotted our new recycling messages around the borough. We've partnered with local residents and tasty smoothie makers innocent drinks and environmental charity Hubbub to help make recycling easier and a little bit more fun.

Recent public polling conducted by Hubbub showed that one in three Londoners find recycling information difficult to understand with less than half (45 per cent) saying they're confident about what can be recycled. That's why we've simplified it right down to help catch recycling's most wantedthe items that are most valuable and easy to recycle but sometimes don't make it into the recycling. We're after paper, card, cardboard, plastic pots, tubs and trays, tins, glass, cartons and jars. If dirty, just remember to give items a quick rinse and pop them into your recycling.
