Plans submitted for exciting new homes development

Plans for 83 new homes on Barlby Road in North Kensington have been submitted to the Council's Planning department.

The proposals, which are part of Phase Two of the programme to provide 600 new homes in the borough, include 38 social rent homes, four intermediate or key worker rental properties and 41 which will be available on the open market.

The development will also provide an indoor sports facility, an upgraded and enlarged community garden and an extension to a neighbouring NHS dental practice. The community has helped to shape the scheme through two rounds of public consultation and "You Said, We Did" resident engagement sessions.

Once validated, the plans will be visible on the Council's planning application page www.rbkc.gov.uk/planning/searches where residents will be able to comment formally.

Volunteer Centre Kensington and Chelsea are working together with Kensington and Chelsea Social Council to launch a new initiative, K&C Together, a programme that aims to increase the number of Kensington and Chelsea residents working, paid and unpaid, in the borough's voluntary and community organisations. Intermediate and Key Worker Housing Comms

You can help to shape the future of affordable housing in Kensington and Chelsea by taking part in a six-week consultation which is live until Monday 22 November.

The Council is consulting over a new Intermediate and Key Worker Housing Policy setting out how it will provide affordable housing for those who can't afford to rent or buy on the open market but who don't qualify for a social home, including key workers.

The consultation will seek to identify how the Council's limited stock of housing should be

allocated, which roles should be considered as key workers and whether priority should be given to those currently living out of the borough.

It follows a successful Key Worker Pilot Scheme in 2020 which saw more than 325 people express their interest in 14 flats in North Kensington, which were targeted at those working locally in the NHS and education sectors.

New homes coming soon to North Kensington

Work is underway to build 20 new homes for local residents on another of the Council's Phase One New Homes Programme sites at Hewer Street in North Kensington.

The exciting news follows the first spade going into the ground at nearby Kensal Road in July, another of the Phase One sites, where we are building 37 new homes - 27 of which are for social rent with the remaining 10 offered at intermediate rent.

Hewer Street is located opposite St Charles Hospital and the proposals will see 10 of the 20 homes offered at intermediate rent available to key workers as well as the retention of the key facades on Hewer Street and Exmoor Street to respect the heritage and character of the original buildings on site.

Construction is being undertaken by Wilmott Dixon and it is expected that people will be able to move into the new homes on Hewer Street before the end of 2022. All the new homes within the project will remain in Council ownership.

These projects form part of the first phase of the Council's New Homes Delivery Programme to deliver 600 new homes, at least half at social rent – the first homes the Council has built since 2017.

Boost your immunity this winter

The NHS has answered frequently asked questions on the Covid-19 booster and flu jabs, helping you to look after your health this winter.

Which vaccinations should I have this winter?

Everyone over 50, or those with a health condition putting them at higher risk from Covid-19 is eligible for the Covid-19 booster vaccine and flu vaccine. Both are serious illnesses. If you are in these groups, having both the Covid-19 booster vaccine and flu jab is the best way to protect yourself.

I've had two doses of Covid-19 vaccine, why do I need a booster?

The Covid-19 booster will help improve your longer-term protection against getting seriously ill from the virus.

Will the flu jab give me flu?

No, the flu jab cannot give you the flu. It is an inactivated vaccine, meaning it does not contain any of the live flu virus.

Can I have both vaccines at the same time?

Yes, if you are offered both vaccines, it's safe to have them at the same time.

Is it still safe to get the flu jab if I've had Covid-19?

If you've had Covid-19, it's safe to have the flu vaccine. It will still be effective at helping to prevent flu.

I'm pregnant, will the flu jab or booster vaccine harm me or my baby?

No, having the flu and Covid-19 vaccine will help protect you and your baby. It's safe to have both vaccines at any stage of pregnancy.

How do I get my vaccinations?

Everyone eligible for both vaccinations will be contacted by the NHS/GP practice to arrange an appointment. If your second dose of the Covid-19 vaccine was more than six months ago you can go to the NHS booking website nhs.uk/covidvaccine and book your booster.

Resident Reference Group takes shape

The RRG is part of the Grenfell Rehousing and Allocations Project and will build upon lessons learned from the response to the Grenfell tragedy and residents' own experiences to improve the Council's housing and rehousing service.

The first meeting will take place later this year and members will share their experiences of and ideas about the Council's housing allocations and rehousing processes, review relevant research and recommend how the Council can work differently with residents.

Residents shape next round of Grenfell Projects Fund

Residents from across North Kensington have started to meet over the last few weeks to work together and shape round two of the Grenfell Projects Fund.

The newly appointed Residents-led Panel, comprising North Kensington residents, was set up after residents expressed a desire to take charge and shape the Fund. The Panel is now working together to co-design the application stage and has recently decided to extend the pre-qualification questionnaire (PQQ) deadline to Wednesday 1 December to ensure the Fund is accessed by as many applicants as possible. The Panel will also monitor and evaluate the Fund as it progresses.

We spoke to residents on the Panel about why they decided to get involved.

Local resident Eunicia Harding said: "My neighbourhood is very important to me, especially the young people of W11 and W10. I have an understanding of the borough as I have lived here for over 40 years, so I would like to see the money used wisely and efficiently. I believe that residents should have their say in what happens in their neighbourhood."

Talking about what she would like to gain from getting involved in the Panel, Eunicia said: "I would like to gain a knowledge of how things work in the borough from a different perspective - helping other residents gain support from the Council, allowing them to have knowledge of the borough and giving them a chance to open excellent projects. It's such a brilliant opportunity."



Parent and volunteer Caroline Akello said: "I'm so honoured to be a part of the Panel. It's a great opportunity to get involved in rebuilding North Kensington post-Covid and help local community projects turn the Fund into something tangible.

"As a parent, it's really important to me that I'm part of the dialogue that will shape not only my children's future, but the futures of children across the borough.

Sole Morado, who moved to the borough six years ago, said: "Although I am one of the newer residents on the Panel, my daughter will grow up in this borough so I want to help the community and support projects that will strengthen it long-term."

Applicants who successfully pass the pre-qualification questionnaire (PQQ) stage will be invited to submit a main application from Monday 10 January 2022. The Resident-led Panel will then create a shortlist of applications for members of the public who will award the funds via a voting system in March.

Ever wanted to find out more about Portobello BusinessCentre?

In previous editions of North Ken News, we have shared information about courses, opportunities and training available on your doorstep from Portobello Business Centre (PBC). PBC is an independent, not-for-profit social enterprise that helps local people channel their enthusiasm and interest in entering the world of work and business, providing one-to-one advice, training courses, workshops, seminars and advice on access to business loans.

In case this sounds like something you'd be interested in but you want to know a bit more about PBC, we spoke with PBC CEO, Alex Gajic, to find out more about this local resource.



What is Portobello Business Centre all about?

PBC is all about making a positive change, particularly helping North Kensington residents who have a business idea and would like to start their own business, alongside supporting small, existing businesses to become sustainable and thrive.

When did you join?

It's been a long time... when Portobello Business Centre incorporated in 1995.

Can you give us an example of a success story or an accomplishment that you're proud of?

We have recently taken on board two people under the Government's Kickstart Scheme, both local residents. In just a few short months and after being trained by the team, they are making a significant contribution to PBC.

What are the key challenges facing business in North Kensington?

The last few years have brought some significant challenges to the area. Just as businesses were slowly recovering after the Grenfell tragedy in 2017, the Covid-19 pandemic hit. The pandemic highlighted the need for digital upskilling and how businesses needed to adapt in order to build resiliency. We are proud that all 90+ members of

the North Kensington Connected Business Forum became resilient enough to have survived all these challenges.

What do you hope PBC will accomplish in the next three years?

We want to develop more women-only entrepreneur programmes. We are currently running our fourth 'MyLifeMix' programme with the support of Kensington + Chelsea Foundation and we would like this programme to continue beyond 2021. We are also focusing on growing the membership of North Kensington Connected so that businesses continue to have an opportunity to collaborate, network, and support each other.

Any upcoming programmes that our readers should know about?

We will be running our fourth 'Meet the Experts' programme as part of Global Entrepreneurship Week this November.

Refurb for disabled children's centre

St Quintin Centre in North Kensington has been transformed for young people and families following the Council allocating £350k towards a major refurbishment.

With fresh new carpets, cabinets, outdoor space with a projector for film nights and a well-appointed new kitchen for catering and cooking lessons, the centre reopened its doors following lockdown for the hundreds of families that access services at the centre since it opened 11 years ago.

We went along to the reopening and spoke with staff who will be working at the newly refurbished centre, along with parents whose children attend the centre.

One parent, Helen, said: "I know my children are safe here and they are well taken care of. During the last two years it was really hard because of Covid – I missed the centre badly – but the staff listen and understand our problems. This centre is a break for all of us, including parents. They seem to enjoy the space here and the staff arrange for trips and activities to keep the children happy and occupied."

Elizabeth, a play worker who has been employed at St Quintin's for eight years, said: "We know the children here well and they enjoy their time here, we get the kids to engage and interact with us and make memories and progress while learning new skills. We

cater to all the kids – those who are new and those who have been with us for years. We know what they're going through, and we cater to it."

The refurb has allowed for spaces to be reimagined to create the best environment for supporting families and has allowed for new activities to be organised, such as smoothie making at the dedicated smoothie bar – for which the ingredients are grown in the onsite garden.

The future of Grenfell Tower

The newly-appointed secretary of state, Michael Gove MP, has been meeting bereaved families and survivors, and representative groups, following requests for him to hear views in person. The government knows how important and sensitive a decision on the future of the Tower is. A decision has not yet been made, and community discussions are continuing prior to a decision being reached.

Noise monitoring Noise from on-site works at the Grenfell Tower site is monitored daily to help make sure that it stays below permitted levels. Noise levels are generally well below legal limits, and contractors are asked to keep noise to a minimum early in the morning or in the evening.
