Pop-up shops for start-up sellers

A lively new shopping space is coming to North Kensington with local creators, entrepreneurs and business owners at its heart.

Thorpe Close is a pop-up high street connecting Ladbroke Grove with Portobello Road, created by the Westway Trust. As well as offering a new area for market visitors to explore over the weekend, the commercial units will remain open throughout the week, allowing locals to enjoy the new space too.

Ten commercial units, or "pods", are up for grabs to allow budding sellers to reap the benefits of market trading in a modern and versatile space. The new spaces support enterprise in the area and are all accessible, affordable and flexible for community and business use.

The pods cost £140 per-week to rent on a short-term let and are not suitable for the sale of food or beverages.

Transfer of the Grenfell Tower site to central Government

In September 2018, the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government announced the establishment of a Grenfell Memorial Commission to determine the long-term future of the Grenfell Tower site.

In February, the Council's Leadership Team is being asked to approve the transfer of the Grenfell Tower site to the Government. This will allow the Government to take responsibility for the site, as announced last year, until its long-term future has been determined by the Commission.

The site for transfer includes the footprint of the Tower and some of the adjacent land, including part of Lancaster Green. This area is all within the site cordon, currently managed by the independent Site Management Group, and is necessary to keep the Tower safe and secure.

The Memorial Commission will be made up of 10 community representatives, including the bereaved, survivors and local residents. It will develop a proposal for the future of the site, including the shape and size of a future memorial. Lancaster West residents will be represented on the Commission to ensure local concerns about open space are taken into account. Any future memorial will be subject to the normal planning rules.

Community spotlight

Community champion Tarek tells us about some of the work he does to make North Kensington a better place.

The unique kind of community togetherness found in North Kensington doesn't happen by accident. It's the champions and advocates from within the community, dedicating their time to the people around them, that has created an area that is celebrated locally, nationally and internationally.

We spoke with one such champion, Tarek Gotti, a member of the Henry Dickens Court Residents' Association. Tarek lives in the Henry Dickens Estate and has been a member of the residents' association for two years. For Tarek, it's second nature to bring people together and spread positivity in his area. He

One thing that Tarek insists is that cooking is the ultimate way to bring people together.

Tarek enjoys talking to his neighbours: elderly people, disabled people, young people and anybody who he meets to understand what their priorities are so that he can best represent them. What's important to Tarek is encouraging more people to have their voices heard in community groups to make sure the future of North Kensington is community-driven.

We know that Tarek is just one of the countless individuals in North Kensington who commit their time to this part of the borough and the people who live in it.

Concerned about your health – get an NHS enhanced health check

The NHS is offering enhanced health checks for residents who may be concerned about their health. These are aimed at finding the early signs of health problems or underlying health conditions.

For adults, enhanced health checks include:

- Monitoring for long term conditions such as diabetes and advice you need to take to manage these conditions.
- Physical health checks (looking at weight gain, blood pressure and cholesterol).
- Health advice around stopping smoking, alcohol intake and substance misuse.
- Addressing concerns around breathing difficulties.
- General health and wellbeing conversations to check how you are feeling.

There are also enhanced health checks for children. Your GP will check concerns around breathing, weight, dental hygiene and how they feeling generally.

Are enhanced health checks the same as screening?

Screening is different from health checks. It's when clinicians screen or check for specific conditions or poisons, based on scientific evidence about the population's potential health needs.

The air around Grenfell is checked continuously and Public Health England has not found extra pollution caused by the Grenfell tragedy. However, we understand that local people are worried, and the Government is bringing forward testing of the soil around Grenfell for possible harmful pollution.

If screenings are required, residents will be contacted immediately.

Residents wanted to help with new health survey

The Council is on the lookout for North Kensington residents to assist in an annual health and wellbeing survey of local people.

The survey will be carried out with full involvement of the NHS, residents' associations, community groups and academic advisors from Imperial College. It will take place between April and May 2019 and aims to reach 2000 residents in North Kensington.

It is a forward-looking piece of work, to look at health and wellbeing now and over the next four years. It will be used to understand how health needs are changing over time, what residents find supports health and wellbeing, and how services can respond to the changing needs.

Successful applicants will be offered training and will be supported to carry out surveys in a variety of places, including community centres and on doorsteps.

Council agrees £50m for Grenfell recovery over the next five years

The Council's Leadership Team approved the Grenfell Recovery Strategy, including £50m of funding over the next five years in January.

The Strategy sets out the Council's plans to support long-term recovery for the bereaved, survivors and the local community. It has been shaped by national and international evidence on disaster recovery and the wide range of engagement activity which has taken place since June 2017.

The Strategy commits the Council to establishing a dedicated service to support individual recovery for the bereaved and survivors. This service has been co-designed with them and is already up and running in its initial form. A full service will be established by April 2019.

The Strategy also outlines the plans to support community-led recovery in the local area. This includes ongoing community-based support to those affected and a community programme for the Notting Dale area, including a local grants pot with funding for key community priorities. This will be designed with Notting Dale residents.

The Strategy also captures broader Council initiatives to support recovery, including plans to build new social housing, changes to Council governance, changes to housing management services, a new Economy Strategy and a new People Strategy. All of these initiatives will be brought together in a new Council Plan, that will have Grenfell recovery at its heart.

Youth sessions pave the way for future services

Young people are to remain in the driving seat over new services available to them in the borough. Following a series of successful sessions, new spaces have been proposed around North Kensington including a youth hub at the former Lancaster Road Youth Club and youth centres in Notting Dale, Golborne and Dalgarno wards.

Outdoor activity spaces and a water-sports club at Canalside Activity Centre also featured on young people's wish-lists with a broader range of activities and pop-up events proposed too.

These include CV writing sessions, help with writing job applications and interview preparation.

One thing has been clear so far from conversations with almost 800 young people: they want more of a say on the things that affect them and they want services delivered where they live. The Council are continuing to talk with young people in the borough and there's still time to have your say. Have your voice heard on the future of youth services by contacting the Council.

Local ideas go large with Green Shoots fund

Since its launch in September last year, the Green Shoots fund from the Kensington & Chelsea Foundation has paved the way for community initiatives around North Kensington.

The fund was set up as a springboard for small community projects and to make it possible for ideas to be realised. There is a pot of £50,000 a year available for the next three years for Green Shoots projects which are intended to bring hope and joy to the community. Grants awarded so far have allowed for a Christmas dinner for those who are less advantaged, community gardening clubs, fun days and a community cook-off.

Arts and health activity centre *The 240 Project* received a grant from Green Shoots to help them provide creative arts groups and health-improving activities to those affected by homelessness and exclusion.

Throughout the year *The 240 Project* provide isolated people with one-to-one support in life skills for independent living, such as cooking, budgeting, working through debt and building tenant relations.

After applying for a Green Shoots grant before Christmas last year, *The 240 Project* were given funding to have a Christmas party to bring people together at a time when loneliness and isolation can feel the most extreme. The party, with full Christmas dinner, was held at their base in Latymer Community



Church. Everyone who attended also received a small gift and a Christmas card.

Recently the team set up a stall at the Portobello Winter Weekends Festival to sell crafts to fundraise for the centre and tell people about the work they do.

4.North Kensington Sports Centre, Walmer Road, W10 (mixed recycling, clothes and shoes)

5.Sainsburys, Canal Way, W10 (clothes and shoes)

Please ensure all recycling is dry and clean and do not recycle items not suitable to be recycled, especially food!
