Kensington and Chelsea has a newly-selected set of councillors following the local elections held in May.

The Council is now composed of 35 seats for the Conservative party, 13 seats for the Labour party and two seats for the Liberal Democrat party following the elections, in which 31,621 residents, or 32.7 per cent of the electorate, turned out to cast their votes.

Monkeypox: what you need to known

You may have heard about monkeypox in the UK. But what is it, what are the symptoms and how can you access help and information?

Monkeypox is a rare infectious disease and while there are a number of cases in the UK, the risk is low. Monkeypox is usually a mild selflimiting illness, spread by very close contact and most people recover within a few weeks.

With recent cases predominantly being in gay and bisexual men, UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) is advising these groups in particular to be alert to any unusual rashes or lesions on any part of their body, especially their genitalia. Symptoms also include a fever, muscle aches, chills and exhaustion, headaches and swollen lymph nodes. If you think you have monkeypox symptoms – however mild:

- Contact NHS 111 or call a sexual health clinic immediately. Your call will be treated sensitively and confidentially.
- Avoid close personal or sexual contact with others until you know that it is not monkeypox.

Borough remembers on fifth Grenfell anniversary

Tuesday 14 June was the fifth anniversary of the Grenfell tragedy, in which 72 Kensington and Chelsea residents, including 18 children, lost their lives.

A range of community-led events, both national and local, took place throughout the day to mark the anniversary, creating opportunities for people to come together to grieve, reflect and remember.

Westminster Abbey hosted a service of remembrance attended by bereaved, survivors and local residents and local and national dignitaries. The service was led by the Dean of Westminster and candles were lit as community leaders read the names of the 72 people who lost their lives.

A multi-faith memorial service was held at the base of Grenfell Tower in the afternoon, including addresses from faith leaders and music and poetry performed by bereaved and



survivor children. The service was attended by the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and thousands watched from within the site and the surrounding area.

Following the service, thousands came together for the Silent Walk, starting at the Notting Hill Methodist Church and finishing at the base of the Tower. A range of other community-led events took place across North Kensington, including for residents of the Lancaster West Estate. Follow this QR code to watch the memorial service held

New hub signposts support for rising cost of living

elp is available for Kensington and Chelsea residents struggling with the rising cost of living via a new online portal.

Information about the range of support available both from the Council and external organisations, including a benefits calculator and details of the Household Support Fund, can be found by heading to www.rbkc.gov.uk/cost-of-living

The Council is using £1.18 million from the Government's Household Support Fund to provide immediate assistance for the cost of food, energy and other essentials.

The available funding includes:

- £645,000 for around 4,300 pexnsioners in receipt of housing benefits or council tax reduction
- £409,950 to provide free school meals for around 4,500 eligible children over six holiday weeks and two inset days in September
- £3,000 to support vulnerable groups who present in crisis to the Council's Family Services team
- Grants of up to **£100** for an estimated **170** care leavers in their own accommodation and vulnerable groups known to Family Services

Social workers and the Family Services team will be directly contacting those eligible for these funds, so there is no need for residents to take any action.

We're also working with Green Doctors who offer support through home visits or telephone consultations to elderly residents, those on a low income or those with a disability. The Council aims to provide at least 100 free home energy consultations every year.

The famous festival was held online in 2020 and 2021 to allow organisers to protect public health during the Covid pandemic.

Tessa Williams, who has lived in the Notting Hill area for her entire life and first attended Carnival at the age of six, is excited to see the event coming back to Notting Hill. She told *Our Borough*:

"My mum and dad would dress me and my sisters in nice clothes and comb our hair, then we would go



out on the streets which were filled with crowds of people dancing, singing, eating, laughing just all really having a great time.

"I remember loud music being played on nearly every corner coming from large speakers and people dancing around. My favourite part was watching the procession go by with people wearing the most beautiful costumes. There were so many colours and it looked so beautiful and magical to me. "It's exciting to know that we will be able to celebrate Carnival once again. It was sad we were unable to attend for two years due to the pandemic. Carnival is very important to our community and our culture and we look forward to celebrating once again with friends, family and the community."

Service for children is best in Britain

Youngsters using special educational needs and disability (SEND) facilities in Kensington and Chelsea are accessing the best service in Britain, according to a glowing Ofsted report.

The inspection of the borough's SEND provision found it to have the fewest recommended areas of development of any local authority in the country and reserved special praise for the high aspirations leaders hold for the ambitions of young people in their care. It also found that:

- Co-production and the voices of children, young people and their families steers the development of the service
- Staff have been creative during Covid-19, reaching families with resources during lockdowns and implementing a well-considered Covid-19 recovery plan in recent months
- Children and young people accessing the services achieve well and are supported with development, education, and employment.

Recent investment in facilities that support SEND children and their families include the opening of the £39 million Kensington Queensmill – the borough's first dedicated special school – and a £350k contribution to the refurbishment of St Quintin Centre in North Kensington.



Parent Helen, who has a child who uses the St Quintin Centre, said:

"I know my children are safe here and they are well taken care of. During the last two years it was really hard because of Covid – I missed the centre badly – but the staff listen and understand our problems."

Local resident Rana, whose son Elias also uses the St Quintin Centre, added:

"My son responds so well to the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities support offered by the Council, the staff at the St Quintin Centre are like his second family. In a way we have raised him together."

Construction careers await Building Lives Academy graduates

A local resident is hoping to carve out a career in construction after becoming one of the first young people to graduate from the Building Lives Academy.

Moesha McColl wants to work in the building industry after successfully completing the 11-week Academy, which is a partnership between the Council, developer Wilmott Dixon and the London Learning Consortium. The fully-funded course prepares 16-to-24-year-olds for a move into an apprenticeship, job or higher-level training in construction or logistics.

Based out of premises in North Kensington provided by the Council on a social investment lease, Moesha combined classroom-based sessions in everything from digital skills and employability to English and maths with practical work experience.

This included helping out at the nearby Kensal Road site where Willmott Dixon is currently building some of the Council's planned 600 new homes for the borough.

Moesha said:

"Prior to the Building Lives Academy, I wasn't really doing anything. The course attracted me, especially the chance to do practical work and to get more females into something that's normally male-dominated.

"Now I hope I can get a job or apprenticeship in construction. That wouldn't have been a thought for me



at all before, but now I know there are lots of options. If you get the opportunity to do this, you should definitely take it."

Andre Duffus, tutor for employability and digital skills, said:

"It's very rewarding to see young people come together to get qualifications and then to go on and use those qualifications in their future."

Major milestone for new Council homes

Ur first council-built homes in years are a step closer to completion after the final beams at the top of the new buildings at Kensal Road and Hewer Street were installed.

These are two significant milestones in our New Homes Delivery Programme which aims to build 600 new homes across the borough, 300 of which will be for social rent.

Kensal Road and Hewer Street are two of four of our Phase 1 new homes delivery sites, which will see us deliver 98 homes in total.

At the Kensal Road site we are providing 38 new homes – 28 at social rent and 10 for key workers, with four of those homes being accessible. There will also be a shared garden area for residents, with flexible community space and a retail unit at ground floor.



Hewer Street will provide 20 new homes to rent, 10 of which will be offered to key workers and 10 open market. This site offers two accessible homes.

These new homes will also use energy efficient technology and improved levels of insulation to reduce fuel bills while ensuring that quality of build and safety issues remain paramount. In addition, all areas of the buildings will have sprinklers as well as incorporating other design features to focus on fire safety measures.

We'll be handing over the new homes at Hewer Street to local people towards the end of the year and then early next year Kensal Road will welcome its first residents.
