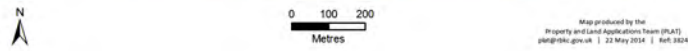
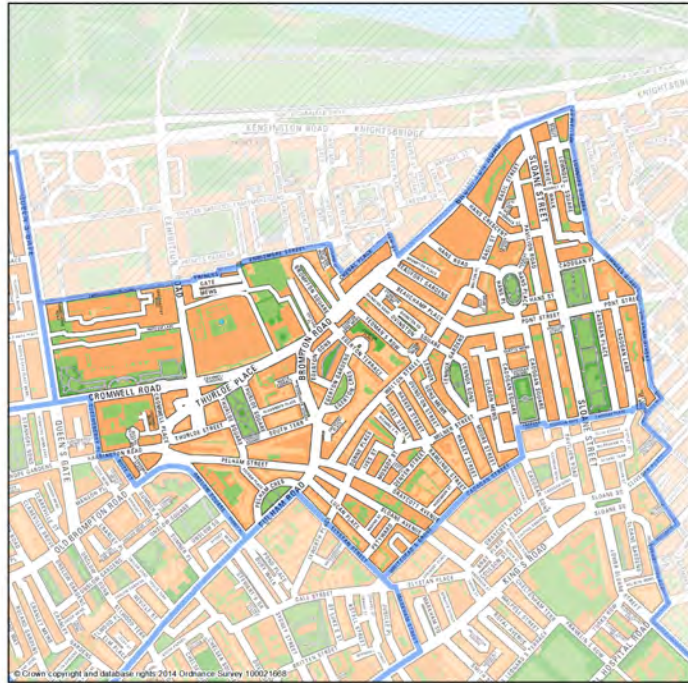

Brompton and Hans Town Ward Profile



Introduction

The Census occurs once every ten years, the most recent of which fell on 27 March 2011. This report gives a summary of Census data for Brompton and Hans Town ward.

In 2014, each ward in Kensington and Chelsea had changes made to its ward boundaries meaning that no Census data exists specifically for these new wards by the Office for National Statistics. To alleviate the data gap, this summary uses Output Areas (OAs) as the building blocks for the new wards. OAs are the smallest Census geography, containing circa 150 residents. OAs are allocated using a best fit model, therefore ensure that these profiles are treated, and the numbers they contain, as being illustrative only.

For ease of use Census data has been subdivided into three distinct themes:

- Who we are...

Population, ethnic group, country of birth, passports held, religion, health

- How we live...

Marital status, living arrangements, household composition, accommodation, tenure, car or van availability, overcrowding

- What we do...

Economic activity, hours worked, qualifications and students, industry, occupation, unpaid care

Disclaimer: All data relates to the Census 2011 figures released by the ONS and all figures are rounded to one decimal place in the text and to one significant figure in the charts.

Headline data

Rankings are for the 18 wards in the borough and are sorted in descending order.

In Brompton and Hans Town...

...the usual residents population is 10,218. The workplace population is 24,999 an increase of 144.7 per cent compared to the usual residents population.

... the population density is 105.2 people per square hectare, ranked 14th lowest and compares to 130.8 in the borough.

...English is the main language for 66.3 per cent of residents (6,580).

...6.9 per cent of residents speak French as a first language, 3.0 per cent speak Italian and 3.3 per cent speak Spanish as a first language.

...75.1 per cent of all residents are classified as having a White ethnicity.

...4.0 per cent of residents gave their ethnicity as Arab, the 9th highest percentage in the borough.

...23.9 per cent of residents gave a nationality that relates to Britain or Northern Ireland, ranked 17th in the borough, lower than the average of 30.9 in Kensington and Chelsea and 38.3 per cent in London.

...39.7 per cent of residents were born in the UK compared to 50.1 per cent in Kensington and Chelsea.

...24.7 per cent of residents arrived in the UK within the last seven years.

...47.3 per cent of residents have a UK passport.

...38.6 per cent of households are owner occupied, a decrease of 6.6 percentage points, whereas the private rented sector has increased by 16.1 percentage points to 53.8 per cent of households.

...55.7 per cent of households do not have access to a car or van, compared to the borough average of 56.0 per cent.

...57.2 per cent of residents have a level 4 (degree equivalent or above) qualification.

...42.2 per cent of working residents work more than 49 hours per week.

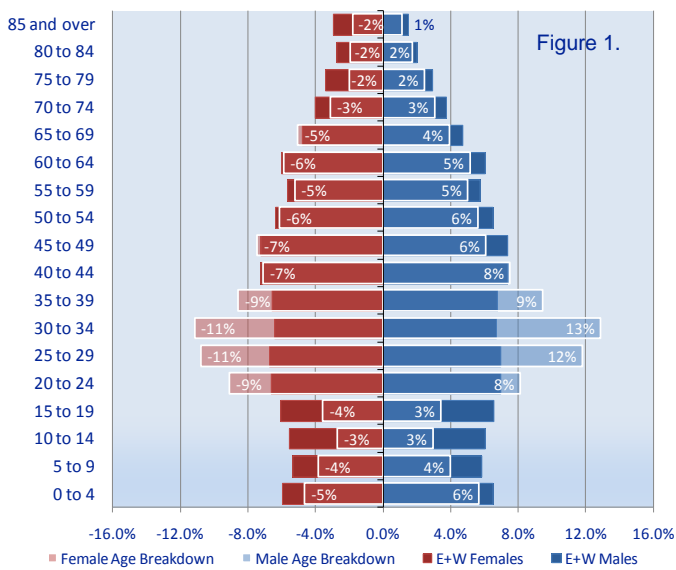
Who we are...

Population Overall

The population of Brompton and Hans Town is 10,218 residents and is the highest populated ward in the borough. The population of Kensington and Chelsea decreased 0.2 per cent from 158,896 to 158,649 residents (2001).

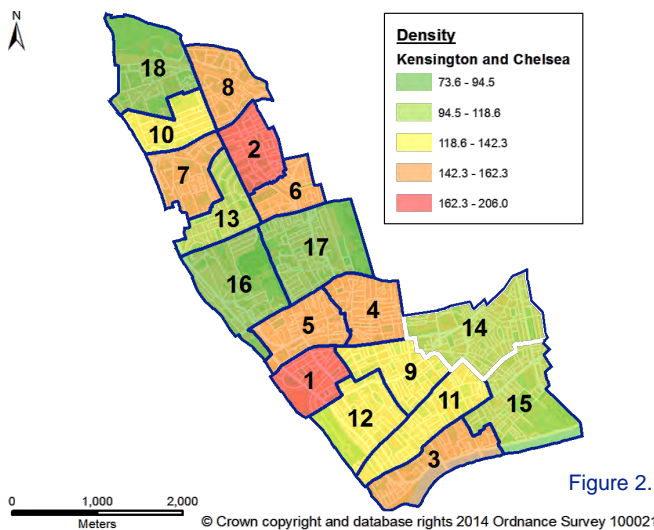
Population Age

Figure 1 shows the age structure of Brompton and Hans Town compared to England and Wales split by gender, and notably shows higher numbers of male residents aged between 25 and 39. Overall in Brompton and Hans Town, 24.0 per cent of residents are aged less than 24, 62.9 per cent between 24-64 (of working age) and 13.1 per cent are aged over 65 (i.e. of pensionable age). In Kensington and Chelsea overall, 25.9 per cent are aged less than 24, 62.1 per cent between 24 and 64 and 12.0 per cent aged 65 and over.



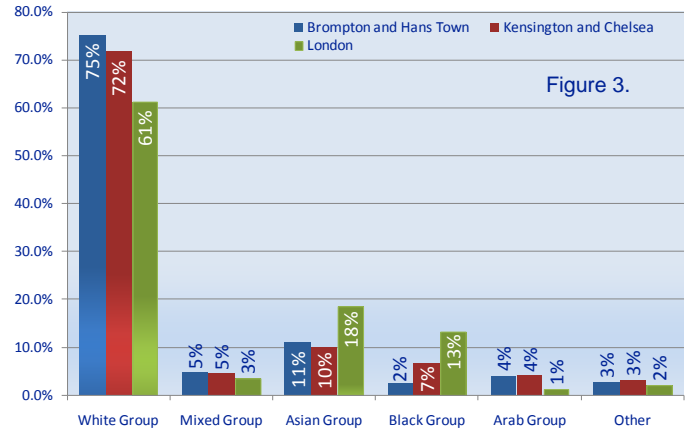
Population Density

Brompton and Hans Town has a population density (see figure 2) of 105.2 people per hectare (ranked 14th), compared to 130.8 in Kensington and Chelsea and 52.0 people per hectare in London. This can be attributed to the high number of museums, places of business, embassies and small gardens/green spaces.



Ethnic Group

Figure 3 shows the broad ethnic groups in Brompton and Hans Town, Kensington and Chelsea and London. The **White** group makes up 75.1 per cent, the **Mixed** group makes up 4.8 per cent, the **Asian** group makes up 11.0 per cent, the **Black** group makes up 2.5 per cent, the **Arab** group makes up 4.0 per cent and the **Other Ethnicity** group makes up 2.7 per cent.

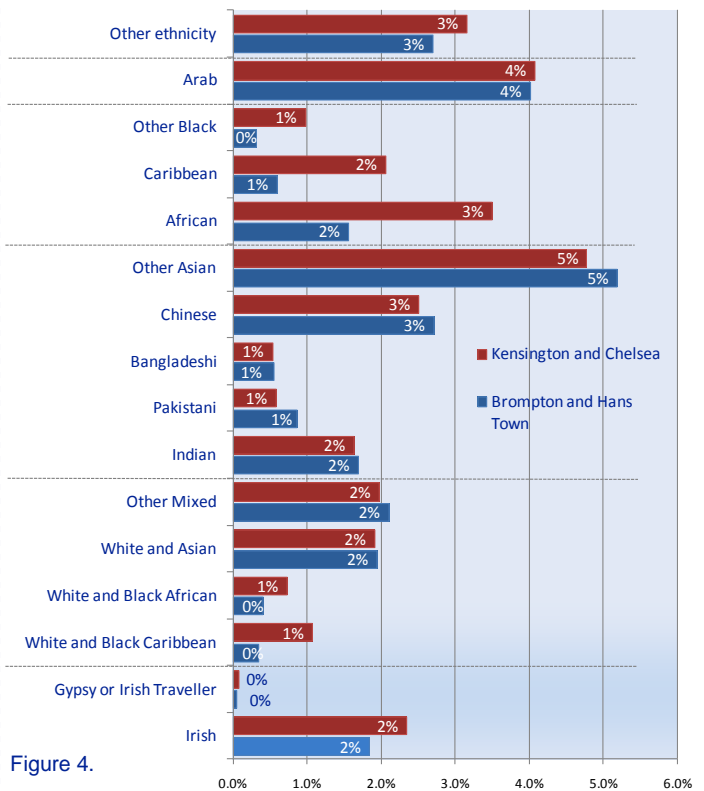


35.6 per cent of residents identified themselves as **White: English/Welsh/Scottish/Northern Irish/British** and a further 37.6 per cent of residents identified themselves as **Other White**.

2.1 per cent of residents (214) identified their ethnicity as **Other Mixed**, ranked 9th in the borough.

5.2 per cent of residents (529) identified their ethnicity as **Other Asian**, ranked 7th in the borough.

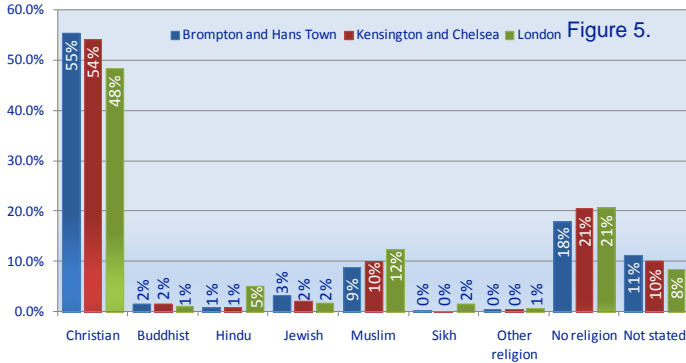
1.6 per cent of residents (159) identified their ethnicity as **African**, ranked 12th in the borough.

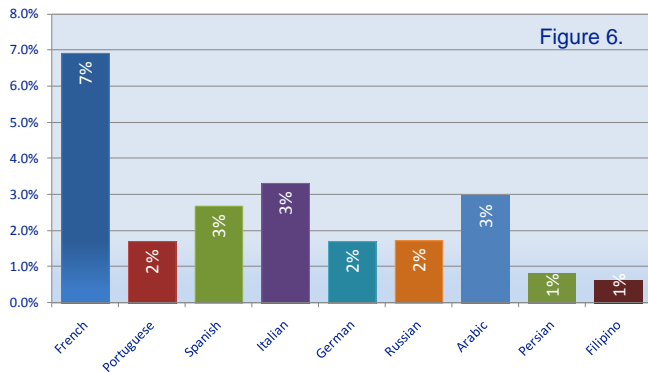
Religion

Figure 5 shows the spread of religions in Brompton and Hans Town compared with the borough and London averages. Overall the majority, 55.5 per cent, of the population of Brompton and Hans Town are **Christian** (5,670 residents, ranked 6th), 8.9 per cent are **Muslim** (907 residents, ranked 9th) and 17.9 per cent have **no religion** (1,829 residents, ranked 15th).



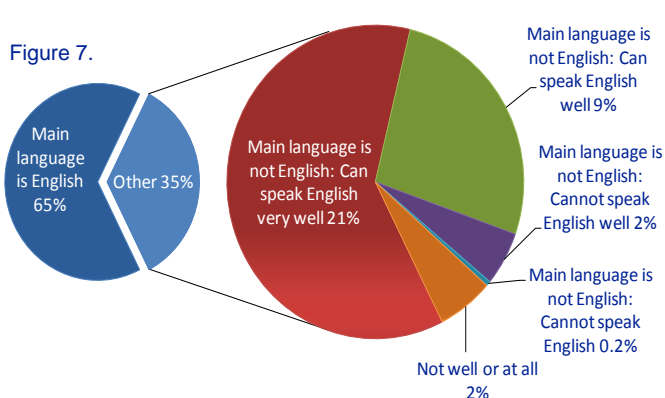
Language

In Brompton and Hans Town, **English** is the main language for all occupants in 66.3 per cent of all households (6,580 residents, ranked 16th). 6.9 per cent of residents speak **French** as a main language (687 residents, ranked 4th). 3.3 per cent speak **Italian** as a main language (330 residents, ranked 3rd).



Proficiency in English

For 64.9 per cent of residents, **English** is the main language (ranked 15th) and where English is not their main language, 21.5 per cent speak English **very well** (ranked 2nd) and 9.3 per cent speak English **well** (ranked 7th). 2.0 per cent **cannot speak English well** (ranked 9th) and 0.2 per cent **cannot speak English** (ranked 13th).



National Identity

23.9 per cent of residents gave a national identity that relates to **Britain or Northern Ireland** (2,446 residents, ranked 17th) compared to 30.9 per cent in the borough and 38.3 per cent in London (figure 8).



Health

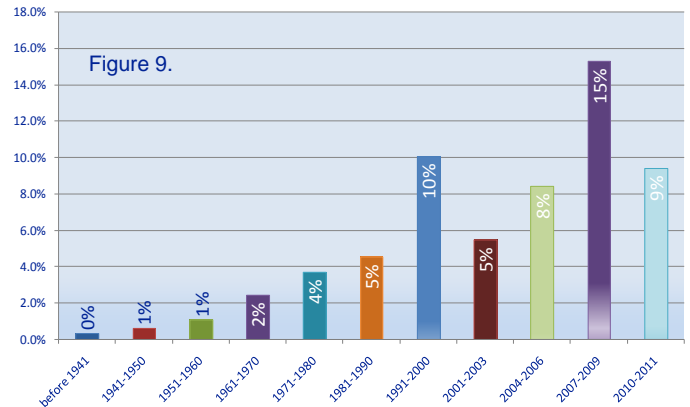
Overall, Kensington and Chelsea is ranked first in England and Wales for the percentage of residents that assess their health as **very good** (57.8 per cent compared to 50.5 per cent in London). In Brompton and Hans Town 61.9 per cent of residents assess their health as **very good** and 29.4 per cent selected **good health**. 1.6 per cent of residents assess their health as **bad** (rank 17th) and 0.5 per cent as **very bad** (rank 15th). This is lower than the London average (3.7 per cent and 1.2 per cent).

Long Term Limiting Illness

8.2 per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town have a **long term limiting illness** (834 residents, ranked 15th), compared to 12.3 per cent in Kensington and Chelsea and 14.1 per cent in London.

Length of Residence in UK and Age of Arrival in the UK (Please Note: Figures Relate to 2011)

38.4 per cent of residents of Brompton and Hans Town were born in the UK, 22.9 per cent of residents arrived **more than 10 years ago** (2,344 residents, ranked 9th), 13.9 per cent in the **last five to 10 years** (1,422 residents, ranked 4th) and 24.7 per cent arrived in the **last five years** (2,528 residents).



Of those **not born in the UK** 28.9 per cent of residents arrived in the UK aged between **0-19**, 61.2 per cent between **20-44**, 9.0 per cent between the ages of **45-64**

World Regions (figure 10)

Figure 10 shows country of birth by number and per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town and Kensington and Chelsea by world region and figure 11 shows the number and percentage for selected European countries. 35.9 per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town were born in **England** (3,672 residents, ranked 16th), lower than the borough average of 45.6 per cent.

5.1 per cent of residents (525 residents, ranked 4th) were born in the **Middle East**, 0.8 per cent higher than the borough average. Brompton and Hans Town residents were also born in **North America** (872 residents, 8.5 per cent, ranked 3rd), **South East Asia** (318 residents, 3.1 per cent, ranked 8th), **Eastern Asia** (376 residents, 3.7 per cent, ranked 5th) and residents born in the **UK and Ireland** (4,058 residents, 39.7 per cent, ranked 16th).

Europe (figure 11)

5.8 per cent of the population of Brompton and Hans Town were born in **France** (597 residents, ranked 4th) compared to 4.2 per cent in the borough. 3.8 per cent of residents were born in **Italy** (389 residents, ranked 3rd), 2.2 per cent in **Germany** (226 residents, ranked 4th) and 2.0 per cent in **Spain** (207 residents, ranked 4th).

Passports Held (figure 12)

47.3 per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town have a **UK passport** (5,153 residents, ranked 16th), 10.8 per cent lower than the borough average. Excluding the UK and Ireland, 24.3 per cent of residents have another **European passport** (2,645 residents, ranked 3rd). 8.0 per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town have a passport from the **Middle East and Asia** (867 residents, ranked 5th).

Figures in blue represent the ward and figures in red represent Kensington and Chelsea.

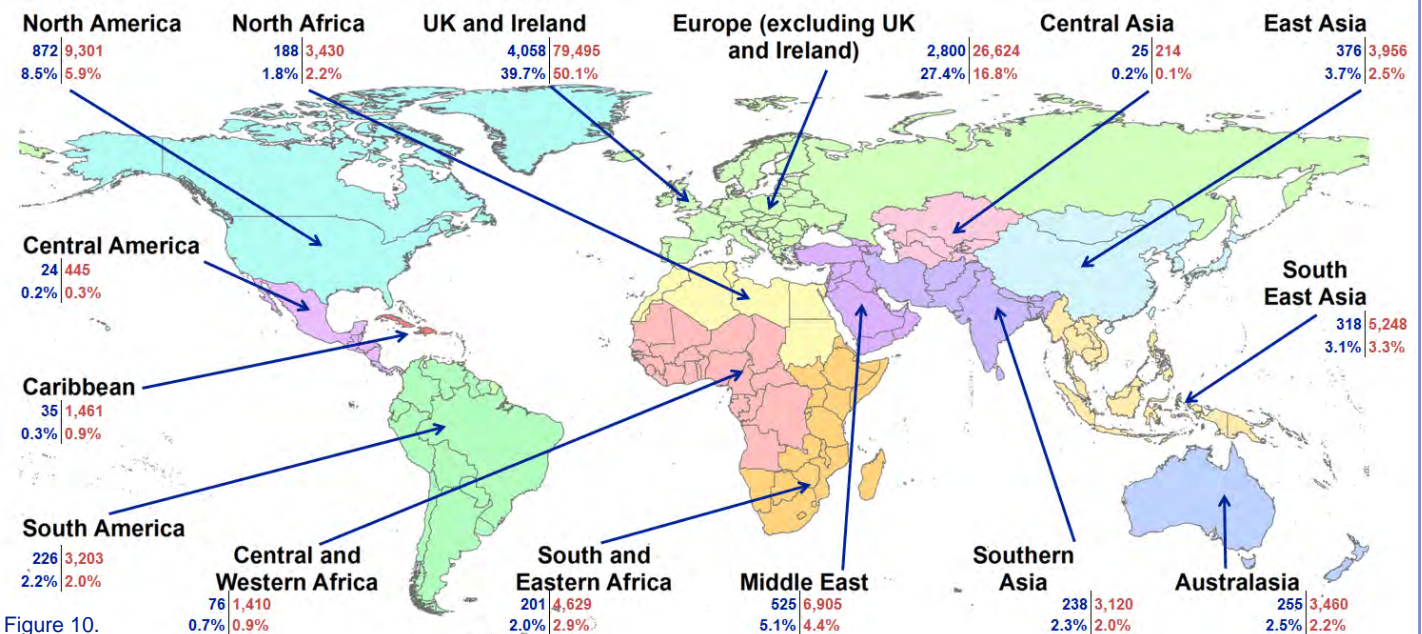

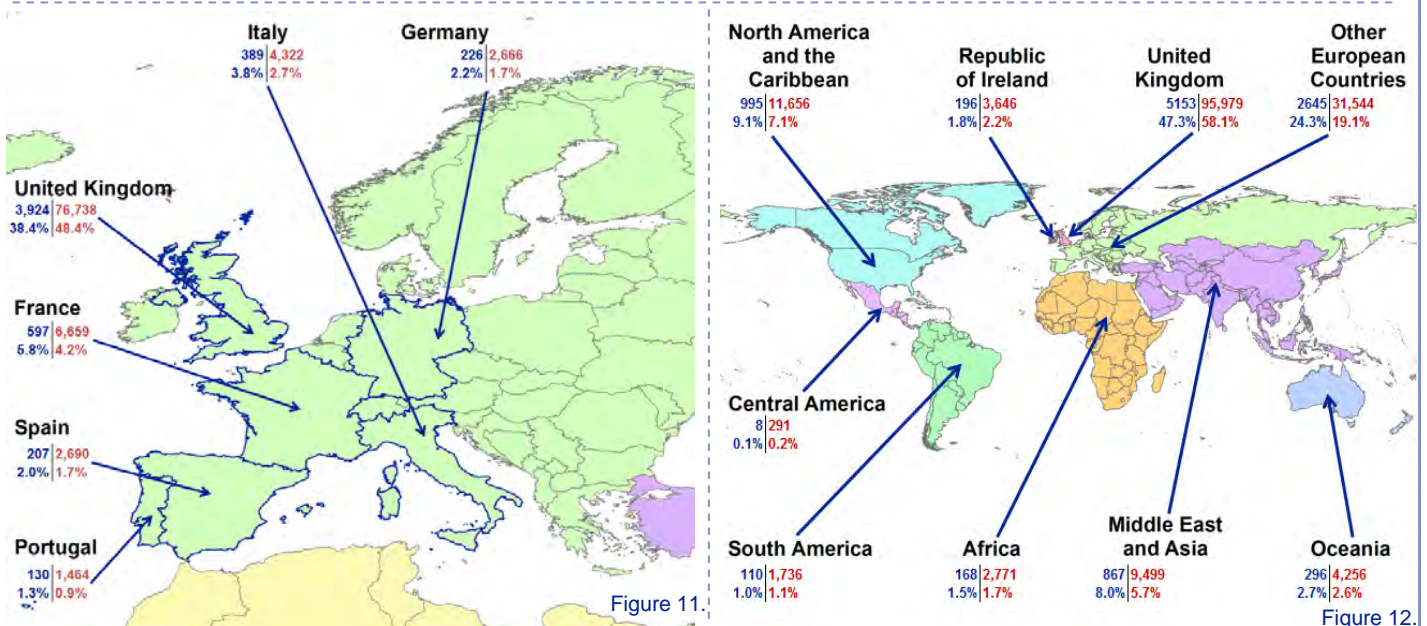

How we live...

Accommodation Type

Flats account for 80.3 per cent of all household spaces in Brompton and Hans Town (4,387 households, ranked 12th) compared to 83.1 per cent in the borough and 52.2 per cent in London. **Houses** account for 19.6 per cent of household spaces (1,071 households ranked 7th) in Brompton and Hans Town compared to 16.9 per cent in the borough and 47.8 per cent in London).

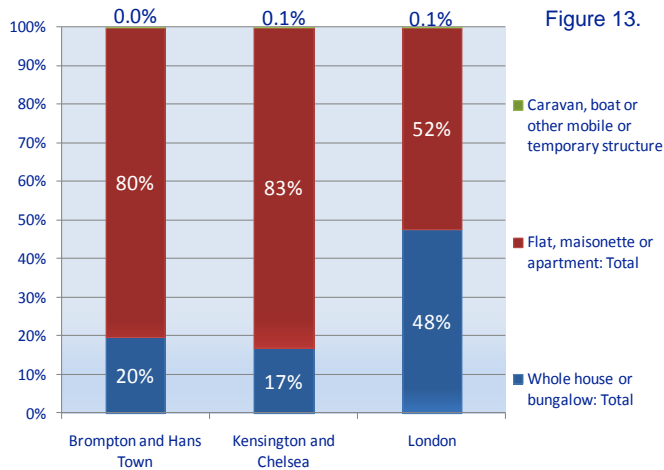

Tenure

38.6 per cent of households in Brompton and Hans Town are **owner occupiers (including shared ownership)** (2,025 households, ranked 11th) compared to 36.6 per cent in the borough and 49.5 per cent in London.

The **private rented** sector accounts for 53.8 per cent of households (2,824 households, ranked 1st), and compares to 35.8 per cent in the borough and 25.1 per cent in London.

Social rented properties in the borough and London account for 24.5 and 24.1 per cent respectively and 7.6 per cent in Brompton and Hans Town (400 properties, ranked 16th).

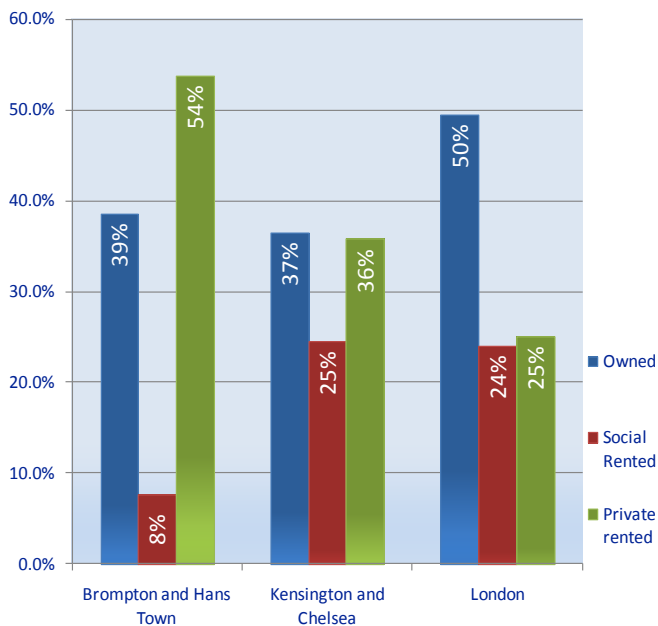

Overcrowding (Bedroom Score)

An occupancy score of -1 or less shows that there is at least one too few bedrooms to adequately accommodate the individuals residing in a household. 5.5 per cent of households in Brompton and Hans Town are **overcrowded** (309 households, ranked 16th). This compares to 8.3 per cent of households in the borough and 11.3 per cent in London.

Marital and Civil Partnership Status

44.8 per cent of adult residents are **single** (4,008 residents, ranked 14th), compared to 48.2 per cent in the borough and 44.1 per cent in London. 40.8 per cent are **married** (including civil partnerships) (3,655, ranked 7th) compared to 36.3 per cent in the borough and 40.2 per cent in London. 2.6 per cent are **separated**, 7.9 per cent are **divorced** and 3.9 per cent are **widowed**.

Household Composition

One person households (where the occupant is aged less than 65 years) account for 42.5 per cent of households in Brompton and Hans Town (2,386 households, ranked 2nd), compared to 36.0 per cent in the borough (figure 15).

Pensioner households (including lone, family and other pensioners) account for 14.1 per cent of households (790, ranked 8th), higher than the borough average (8.4 per cent) (figure 15). **Single pensioner households** account for 10.6 per cent (594, ranked 7th).

Lone parent households make up 4.7 per cent (263, ranked 14th) in Brompton and Hans Town, lower than the borough average of 8.2 per cent (figure 15).

Cohabiting couples make up 6.1 per cent (343 households, ranked 17th). **Married couples** (including civil partnerships) account for 21.4 per cent of households (1201 households, ranked 10th) (figure 15).

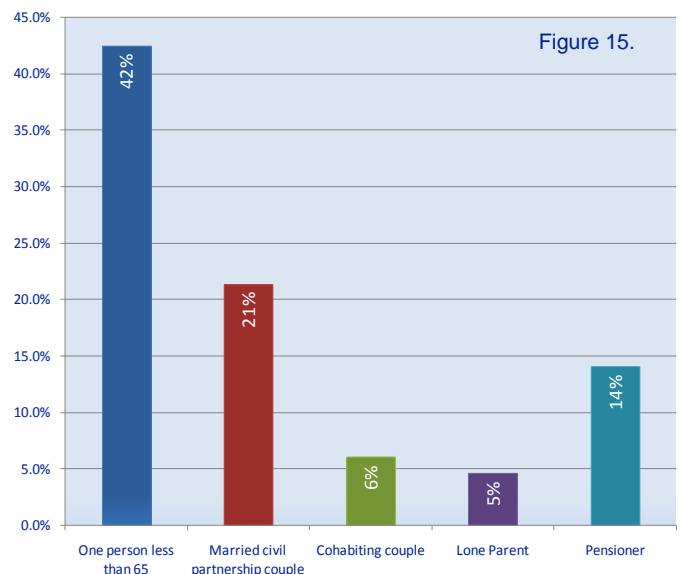

Second Homes

A second home is an address at which a person stays for more than 30 days per year that is not a person's place of usual residence (this might include people working away from home, a student's home address or a holiday home etc.). In Brompton and Hans Town, 29.9 per cent of households are classified as a **second address** (3,053 households, ranked 1st). Of these, 35.5 per cent are second addresses **in the UK** (1,083 households, ranked 15th) and 64.5 per cent are **outside the UK** (1,970 households, ranked 4th).

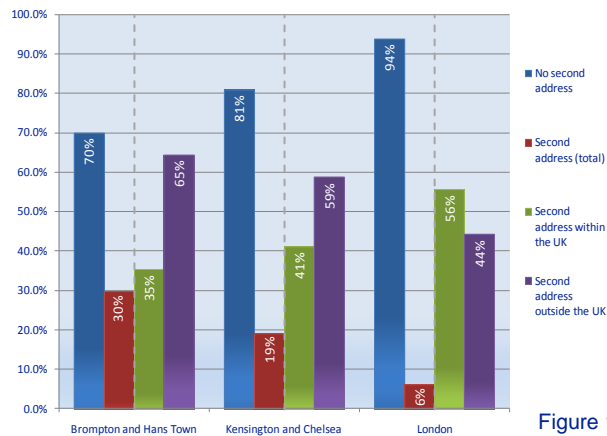

Household Deprivation

Household deprivation is used to classify households that fall within any or all of the four deprivation characteristics.

1. Employment: person within a household not a full-time student who is unemployed or long-term sick
2. Education: no person in the household has at least level 2 education and no person aged 16-18 is a full-time student
3. Health and disability: any person in the household has general health 'bad or very bad' or has a long term health problem
4. Housing: where accommodation is either overcrowded, with an occupancy rating -1 or less, or is in a shared dwelling, or has no central heating.

In Brompton and Hans Town, 38.2 per cent of households have **one dimension of deprivation**, 12.1 per cent have two, 2.2 per cent have three and 0.3 per cent have four. 47.3 per cent of households in Brompton and

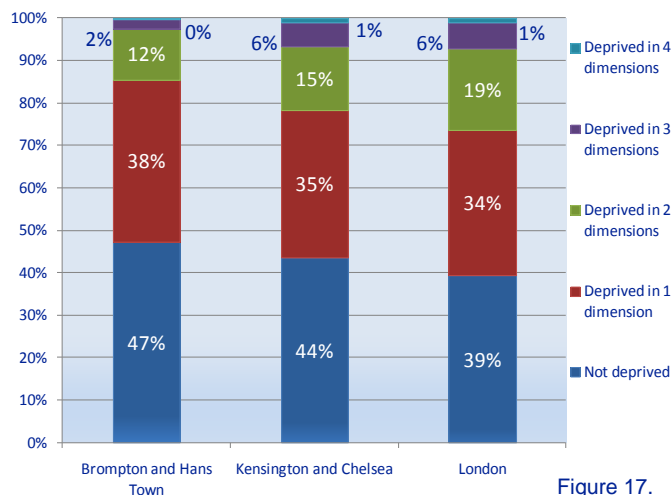

Hans Town are **not deprived in any dimension** compared to the borough average of 43.6 per cent.

Access to a Car or Van

55.7 per cent of households in Brompton and Hans Town **do not have access to a car or van** (3,127, ranked 8th).

33.2 per cent of residents in Brompton and Hans Town have access to **one car**, 8.5 per cent have access to **two cars**, 1.8 per cent have access to three cars and 0.9 per cent have access to **four or more cars**.

Over half of all households in the borough (56.0 per cent) **do not have access to a car or van**, this is the ninth highest percentage nationally and has increased by 5.6 per cent since 2001. In London, 41.6 per cent of households do not have access to a car or van.

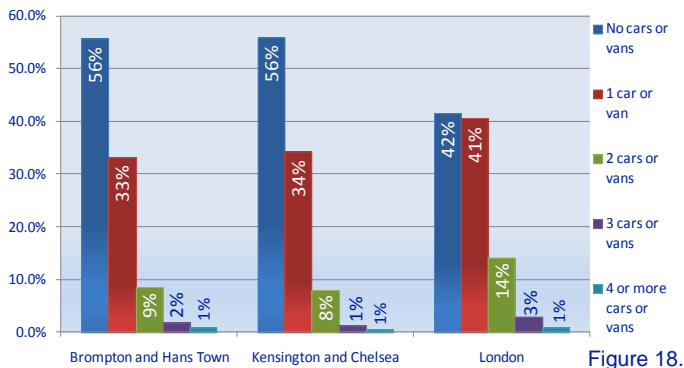

Area Classification

Area classifications group together geographic areas according to key characteristics common to the population in that grouping. These groupings are called clusters, and are derived using 2011 Census data. Brompton and Hans Town is defined as "**Aspiring and Affluent**" with a 81.0 per cent majority falling into this category (ranked 5th). The borough on average is classified as "**Aspiring and Affluent**" with a 72.2 per cent coverage.

Aspiring and Affluent Definition: Higher proportion of people aged 0 to 14, higher proportion of people married, higher proportion of people who are of mixed ethnicity, lower proportion of households with full-time students, a higher proportion of households are semi-detached or terraced, more likely to work in the information and communication, and financial related industries and use public transport to get to work.

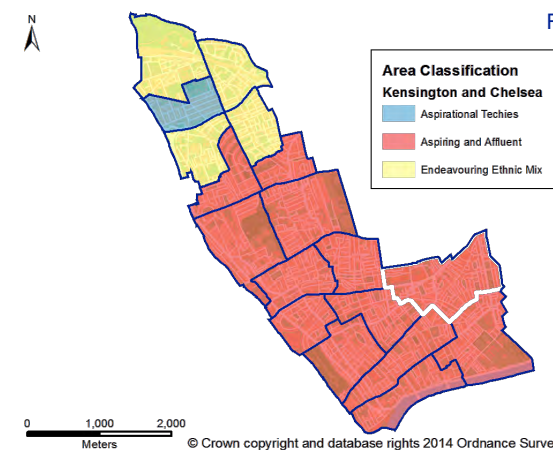


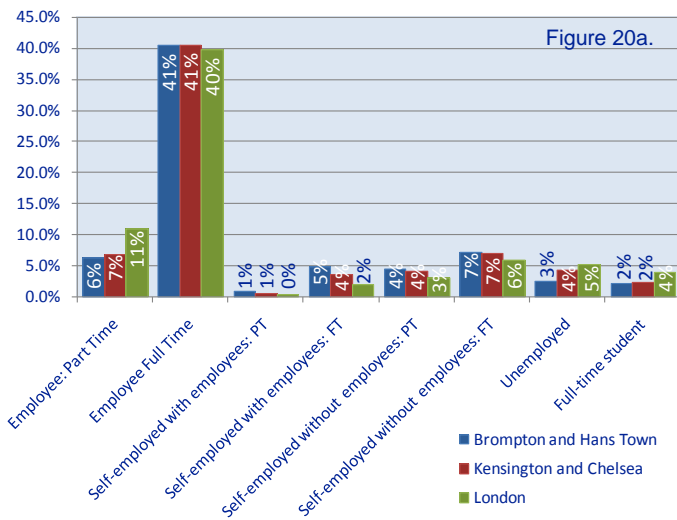

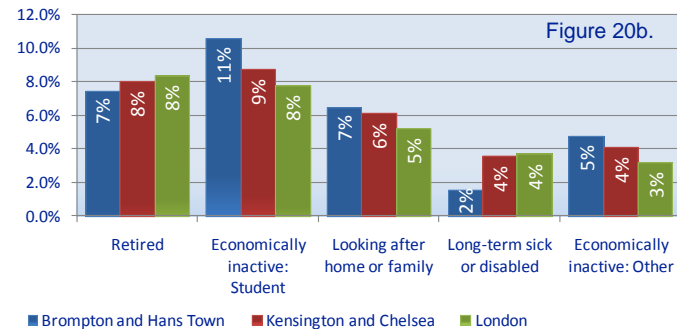
Labour market

Economically active residents are those aged 16 to 74 that are either employed or are unemployed but actively seeking employment. 69.0 per cent of the adult population of Brompton and Hans Town are **economically active** (5,790 residents, ranked 10th) compared to 69.4 per cent in the borough and 71.7 per cent in London.

Overall, 40.6 per cent are **full time** employees (3,404 residents, ranked 10th) and 6.2 per cent are **part time** employees (522 residents, ranked 12th). 17.4 per cent of residents are **self employed** (breakdown in figure 20a.) (1,461 residents) and is comparable to the borough and London averages of 15.4 per cent and 11.7 per cent respectively. 2.5 per cent of the adult population of Brompton and Hans Town are economically active but **unemployed** (213 residents, ranked 18th), compared to 4.3 per cent in the borough and 5.2 per cent in London.



Economically inactive residents are residents aged 16 to 74 that are not in employment and not actively seeking a job. This group includes people who are looking after a home, the retired and some students. 31.0 per cent of the adult population of Brompton and Hans Town are **economically inactive** (2,596 residents, ranked 9th) compared to 30.6 per cent in the borough and 28.3 per cent in London (figure 20b.).



Students are the largest group of economically inactive residents in Brompton and Hans Town, 10.6 per cent (890 residents, ranked 4th), comparable to the borough (8.7) and London (7.8) averages.

Hours worked

42.2 per cent of working residents in Brompton and Hans Town work **more than 49 hours** per week (2,336 residents, ranked 5th), which is typical of many residents of Kensington and Chelsea where the average is 35.1 per cent of residents working these long hours, far higher than the London average of 15.9 per cent.

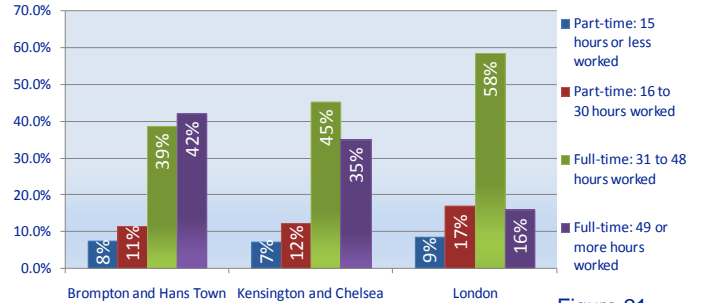

Qualifications

57.2 per cent of the adult population of Brompton and Hans Town ward have a **level 4 qualification (e.g. a bachelors degree)** (5,120, ranked 10th), compared to 52.7 per cent in the borough and 37.7 per cent in London. 6.3 per cent of the adult population have **no qualifications** (560 residents, ranked 12th) compared to 10.1 per cent in the borough, 17.6 per cent in London and 7.4 and 14.6 per cent in 2001 for the borough and London.

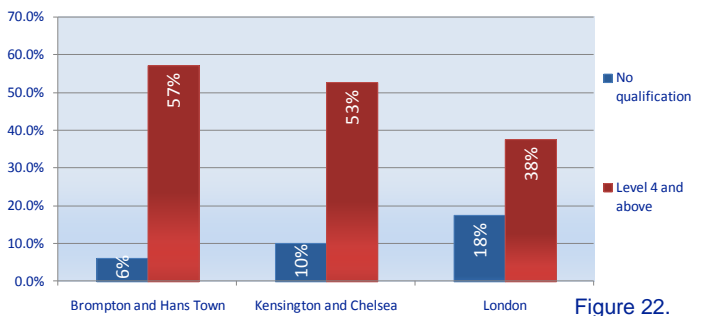

Unpaid care

In Brompton and Hans Town, ward 5.5 per cent (558 residents, ranked 16th) provide **some unpaid care**. Overall in the borough 6.9 per cent provide some unpaid care.

Method of travel to work

The top three methods of travel to work in Brompton and Hans Town are by **Underground/metro/light rail/tram** (22.3 per cent, 1,867 residents, ranked 10th), **car or van** (7.1 per cent, 598 residents, ranked 14th) and **on foot** (10.9 per cent, 916 residents, ranked 2nd). 9.2 per cent of residents **work mainly from home** (772 residents, ranked 4th).

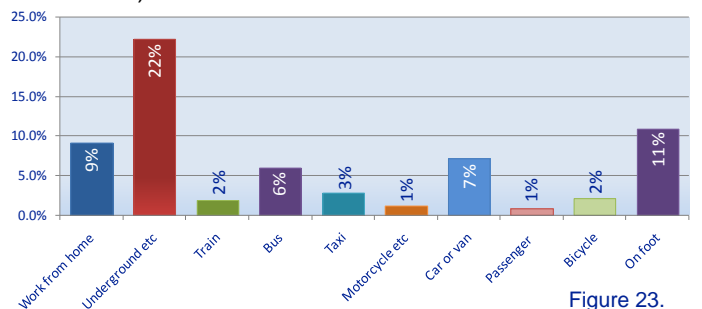

Industry

The industry in which a person aged 16 to 74 works relates to their main job, and is derived from information provided on the main activity of their employer or business. These classifications have been changed which means comparisons with 2001 data cannot be made.

In Brompton and Hans Town, the three largest industry sectors are:

1. Financial and insurance activities

(e.g. banking, administration of financial markets, risk and damage evaluation, pension funding, life insurance)

28.5 per cent (1,574 residents ranked 4th) of economically active residents, compared to 21.5 per cent in the borough and 7.7 per cent in London.

2. Professional, scientific and technical activities

(e.g. legal activities, accounting, marketing, advertising, veterinary activities, translation and interpretation)

17.4 per cent (965, ranked 8th) of those economically active, compared to 16.7 per cent in the borough and 10.9 per cent in London.

3. Wholesale and retail trade; repair of motor vehicles and motor cycles

(e.g. wholesale of food, cars, clothing, beverages, computers, furniture, machine tools, household goods)

8.9 per cent (495 residents, ranked 10th) of economically active residents, compared to 9.6 per cent in the borough and 13.1 per cent in London.

Occupation

A person's occupation relates to their main job and is derived from either their job title or details of the activities involved in their job. This is used to assign responses to an occupation code based on the Standard Occupational Classification 2010 (SOC2010).

In Brompton and Hans Town, the three largest occupation groups are:

1. Managers, directors and senior officials

(e.g. chief executives, senior officials, financial institution managers, officers in the armed forces)

28.9 per cent (1,599 residents, ranked 4th) of those economically active, compared to 23.3 per cent in the borough and 11.6 per cent in London.

2. Associate professional and technical occupations

(e.g. police officers, graphic designers, laboratory technicians, town planners)

27.0 per cent (1,496 residents, ranked 3rd) of those economically active, compared to 24.9 per cent in the borough and 16.3 per cent in London.

3. Professional occupations

(e.g. scientists, engineers, IT professionals, nurses, teachers)

21.8 per cent (1,208 residents, ranked 14th) of those economically active, compared to 23.4 per cent in the borough and 22.5 per cent in London.

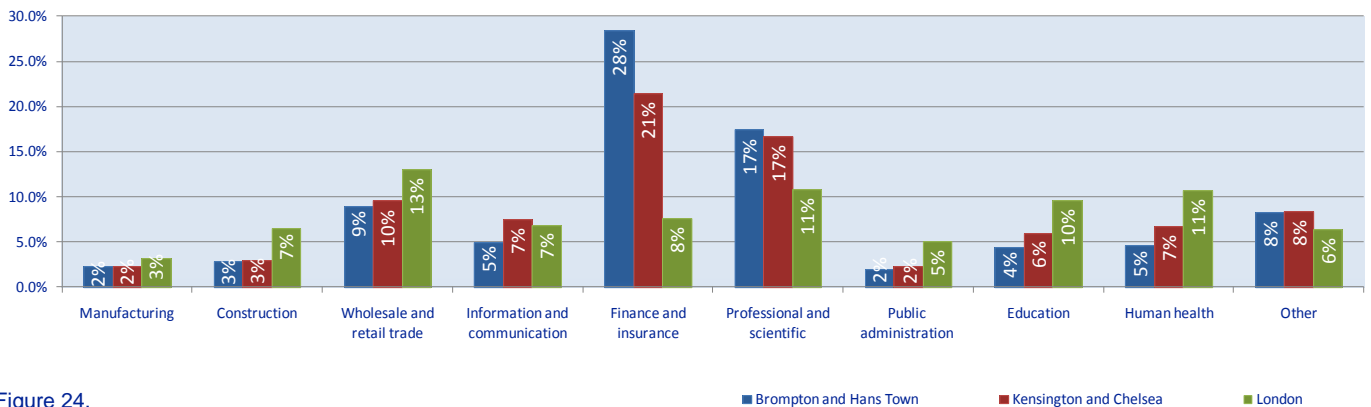

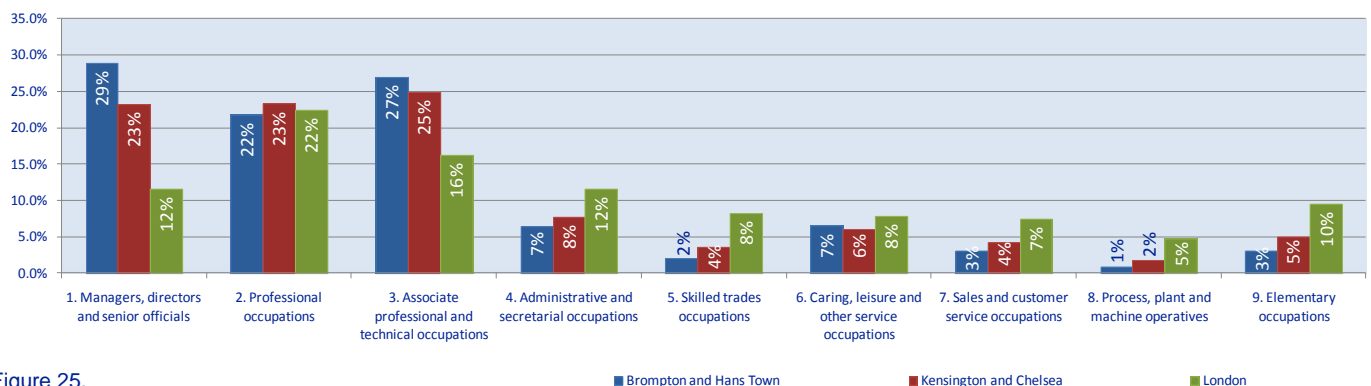

Workday Zones

Workday zones (WZs) are a new output geography for England and Wales which has been produced using workplace data from the 2011 Census. The population of an area changes as people move in and out of an area to work. For the **Workday Population** the **Usual Resident Population** is re-distributed to their places of work, while those not in work are recorded at their usual residence. (ONS, 2014) Figures are compared with the Census 2011 **Usual Population** numbers.

Workday: Population

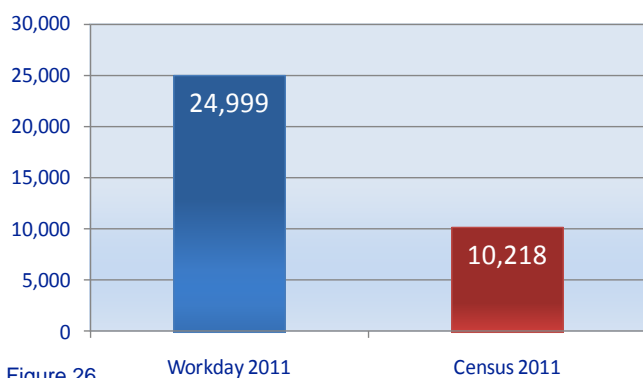


Figure 26. Workday 2011 Census 2011

The **Workday Population** of Brompton and Hans Town increased by 14,781 in comparison to Census data, 24,999 from 10,218 residents (see figure 26). The workday population of Kensington and Chelsea increased by 22.2 per cent from 158,649 to 193,805 residents.

Workday: Density

Brompton and Hans Town has a **Workday Population density** of 257.3 people per hectare (ranked 2nd), compared to 105.2 in the Census. Kensington and Chelsea has 203.7 people per hectare and 55.2 in London.

Workday: Tenure

46.1 per cent of households in Brompton and Hans Town are **owner occupiers (including shared ownership)** (11,487 households, ranked 10th) compared to 43.2 per cent in the borough and 52.4 per cent in London.

The **private rented** sector accounts for 39.3 per cent of households (9,789 households, ranked 4th), and compares to 32.2 per cent in the borough and 24.8 per cent in London.

Social rented properties in the borough and London account for 22.5 and 21.7 per cent respectively and 11.6 per cent in Brompton and Hans Town (2,984 properties, ranked 15th).

Workday: Health

In Brompton and Hans Town, 57.6 per cent of the Workday Population assess their health as **very good** and 34.2 per cent selected **good health**. 1.3 per cent of the Workday Population assess their health as **bad** (rank 17th) and 0.4 per cent as **very bad** (rank 18th). In comparison to the Census, 0.5 per cent assessed their health as **very bad**.

Workday: Qualifications

46.6 per cent of the adult population of Brompton and Hans Town ward have a **level 4 qualification (e.g. a bachelors degree)** (11,065, ranked 11th), compared to 47.9 per cent in the borough and 38.8 per cent in London.

Workday: Religion

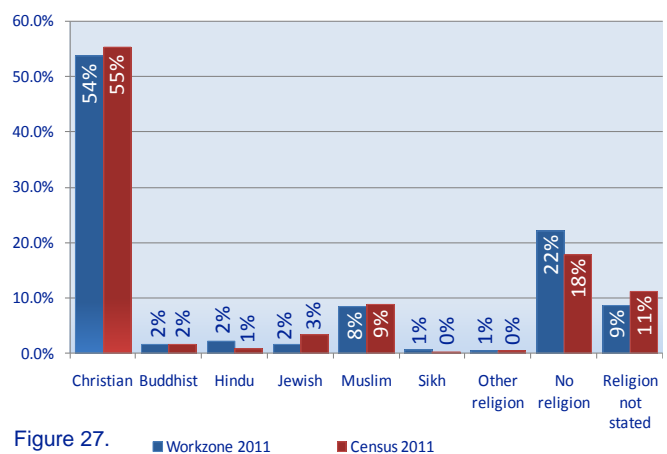
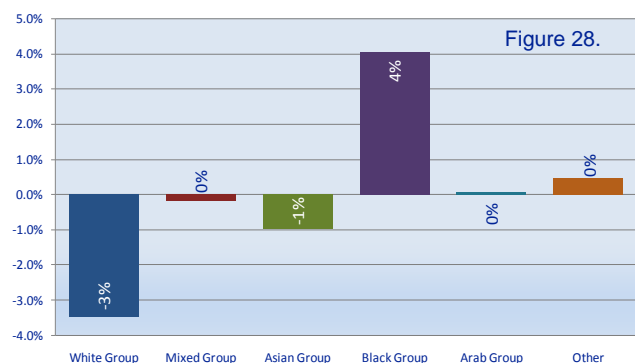


Figure 27. Workzone 2011 Census 2011

Figure 27 shows percentages of the religious affiliations in Brompton and Hans Town. Overall the majority, 53.9 per cent, are **Christian** (13,485 residents, ranked 6th, a decrease of 1.5 percentage points), 8.5 per cent are **Muslim** (2,117 residents, ranked 10th, a decrease of 0.4 percentage points) and 22.2 per cent have **no religion** (5,551 residents, ranked 8th, an increase of 4.3 percentage points).

Workday: Ethnicity

Figure 28 shows the broad ethnic groups in Brompton and Hans Town, Kensington and Chelsea and London, with Census comparisons. The **White group** has decreased by 3.5 percentage points and the **Black/Black British group** has increased by 4.1 percentage points in comparison to Census data.



Workday: Length of Residence in the UK

47.8 per cent of the **Workday Population** in Brompton and Hans Town were **born in the UK** compared to the Census figure of 38.4 per cent. 22.4 of residents **arrived more than 10 years ago**, compared to the Census figure of 22.9 per cent (2,344 residents). 11.2 per cent arrived in the **last five to 10 years** and 9.7 per cent arrived in the **last five years**, compare to 13.9 per cent 24.7 per cent respectively.
