Culture, Arts and Leisure in the Royal Borough

The Royal Borough is rich in art and culture and is host to many national institutions, museums, and significant cultural events and festivals. The borough also has a number of public libraries, leisure centres, parks and open spaces. Map 2.1 details a comprehensive listing of culture, arts and leisure in Kensington and Chelsea broken into the classifications of: 'Culture and Arts: Museums, Galleries, Exhibitions, Theatres and Music', 'Community Arts Venues', 'Events and Festivals', 'Libraries', 'Sports and Leisure' and 'Cinemas'.


Survey data show that residents are satisfied with the culture, arts and leisure facilities in the borough and this data can be seen in figure 2.1 compared against data for inner London. Satisfaction is particularly high for museums and galleries, and parks and open spaces.

CULTURE AND ARTS

The borough is home to many museums, galleries, exhibitions and other cultural and artistic institutions and venues. The council manages two small museums; The Leighton House Museum and Art Gallery and the Linley Sambourne Museum. There are three major national museums located in South Kensington; The Science Museum, The Natural History Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum, See table 2.1 for visitor figures. The Saatchi Gallery opened in autumn 2008 in Chelsea and the borough is also home to Kensington Palace and the Royal Court Theatre. See map 2.1 for the location of these and many more museums, galleries, exhibitions, theatres and cultural venues located in the borough as well as community arts venues.





PARKS AND OPEN SPACES

When residents are asked what they think is the best thing about living in the Royal Borough they mention local parks more often than any other aspect of life in the borough. Map 2.1 shows where the parks and open spaces in the borough are located and as mentioned figure 2.1 illustrates satisfaction with parks and open spaces in the borough, compared with figures for inner London. Parks and open spaces are also used the most frequently of all culture, arts and leisure activities and usage is above inner London averages. In conjunction with figure 2.1, figure 2.2 illustrates usage figures for culture, arts and leisure. The colour schemes of the chart broadly represent frequent usage ('almost every day', 'at least once a week', 'about once a month'), casual usage ('within the last 6 months', 'within the last year') and infrequent use ('longer ago', 'never used').

EVENTS AND FESTIVALS

The borough is host to many well known events and festivals. These include the Notting Hill Carnival, Opera Holland Park, the Chelsea Flower Show and the Portobello Film Festival. The location of these can all be viewed on map 2.1 and it should be noted that some festivals have events at a variety of venues (such as the Chelsea festival) and in these instances a key location is represented on the map. Table 2.1 illustrates visitor figures for events and festivals in the borough from 2006 to 2008.

SPORT AND LEISURE
